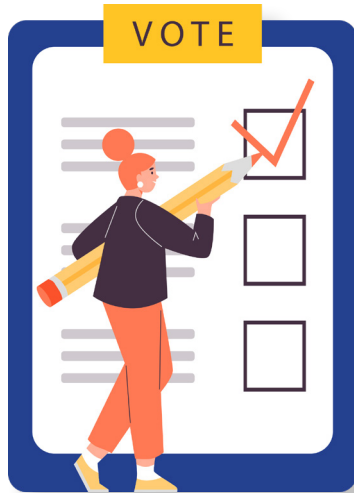

No Tax-Rate Increase Bond Proposal Would Continue to **ENHANCE SAFETY**

School safety continues to be a top priority for our community, and the projects included in the May 2 bond proposal would add an additional layer of safety in Fraser Public Schools.



If approved by voters, the no tax-rate increase bond would add additional security cameras at every school. It would also replace select exterior doors and frames, and classroom blinds on exterior windows. New speakers for the PA system at every school, which were recently replaced through a security grant, are also included in the bond project list.

The remaining bond projects fall into three more key areas:

1. Update building infrastructure, including roofs, and mechanical and electrical systems
2. Update parking lots, sidewalks, and improve site drainage
3. Replace equipment and buses that have reached the end of their useful life.

CURRICULUM CORNER

LITERACY

As Fraser Public Schools continues its focus on literacy at the elementary level, we are excited to invest not only in professional learning, but also in supplemental curriculum materials to help our teachers implement our reading curriculum with fidelity. As has been mentioned in the Curriculum Corner throughout this year, a renewed discussion of literacy across the curriculum is a key area of focus for our teachers this year.

Using grant funds provided to local school districts to combat learning loss from the COVID-19 pandemic, Fraser Public Schools recently

purchased updated literacy materials to supplement our curriculum at the elementary level. All teachers will receive Interactive Read Aloud materials to use for daily lessons on reading skills and strategies. Additionally, we have updated our phonemic awareness and word study curriculum materials. Finally, every elementary school will receive an updated literacy library with over 1,200 titles that teachers can check out to use in their classrooms for small group instruction. The addition of these supplemental resources to our already established curriculum will ensure all teachers have what they

need to address each student's unique needs for literacy instruction.

We will continue to gather teacher input and feedback through professional learning sessions focused on literacy as these resources are rolled out to ensure teachers have the training necessary to implement all the materials and target specific student needs moving out of the COVID-19 pandemic. Early literacy instruction is key to ensuring students' long-term educational success, and Fraser Public Schools is committed to ensuring our teachers have the training and resources to implement reading instruction in a clear, coherent manner.

Fraser Public Schools extends a warm welcome to Mrs. Rebecca Jensen, our newest Board of Education member.

Mrs. Jensen was ceremonially sworn in at the March 13 regular board meeting. She will serve as trustee and fill the vacancy created by Mrs. Linda Corbat's retirement at the end of January.

EARLY CHILDHOOD OPTIONS FOR ALL

At the state and national levels, more and more focus is on providing early childhood learning opportunities for all children. In Fraser Public Schools, we are committed to providing an option that fits every family. All our options feature small class sizes and are open to all Macomb County residents.

For the 2023-2024 school year, Fraser will expand its Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP) at the Dooley Center. This program provides free or low-cost preschool to 4-year-old students. Classes meet Monday-Thursday from 8:35 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

The district also offers half-day tuition preschool for 3- and 4-year-old students that meets two or three days a week.

SSLI Adventure



Salk Elementary is home to the MISD's K-3 Severe Speech-Language Impaired (SSLI) Program. SSLI students recently had a day full of adventure, which truly offered something for everyone. The day began with a morning visit to Pump It Up, an indoor play area in Shelby Township. Students explored the giant inflatable playground together. This was a welcome chance to run and play during a snowy winter week.

The adventure continued with a visit to the Reptarium, an indoor zoo in Utica. Students were able to observe reptiles on display, including many unusual creatures that were new to all. During a presentation by the Reptarium hosts, students were offered opportunities to hold, touch, or look at each animal presented, depending on each child's comfort level. Students met turtles, lizards, monitors, snakes, and even alligators as our hosts shared information about each animal. Students asked many thoughtful questions during this truly "hands-on" learning activity. The Reptarium provided SSLI students with a fun and meaningful context in which to build vocabulary and enrich language. Including a chance to hold a giant snake! Truly something for every kind of learner.

KIDS HEART CHALLENGE

Elementary schools throughout the district participated in The American Heart Association's Kids Heart Challenge.

Collectively, Fraser schools raised over \$17,500 for the American Heart Association!

The Kids Heart Challenge is held at schools across the country, delivering heart-healthy physical activity. The program includes cardio-pumping activities that go beyond exercise and has kids pledge to be more physically active, drink more water, and do a good deed.

Kids learn about the importance of physical activity and how it helps their bodies. This is an important lifelong lesson; kids understanding heart health early can help prevent myriad health problems, including heart disease and stroke. Students also learn the importance of teamwork and helping other people, all while building their self-esteem in an exciting and active way. Program activities include:

Kids Heart Challenge Jump:

Students compete to see who can jump the most times in a minute, while learning about how it burns calories, builds agility, and increases bone density.

Kids Heart Challenge Hoops:

A heart-pumping basketball-based activity that challenges students to work as a team.

Kids Heart Challenge Dance:

Students burn calories and build confidence as they collaborate and

express their creativity with dance moves to the "Cha Cha Slide" or "Space Jam."

Kids Heart Challenge Warrior:

Students build strength and confidence as they crawl, run, and leap as they navigate the obstacle course's cones, hurdles, and balance beam.

Several FPS schools are eligible for a \$500 grant to purchase physical education equipment through U.S. Games. Funds raised by the Kids Heart Challenge support the American Heart Association's lifesaving mission, including work to keep physical education in schools, to provide access to healthy foods for kids, and to pass laws requiring CPR to be taught in schools.

Classroom Transformations Keep Edison Students Engaged

Third-grade classrooms at Edison Elementary have been going through quite a transformation these last few months.

Students have been learning the content through engaging, hands-on activities that have had them cheering and wanting to tell someone at home about what they have learned.

Teachers Mrs. Parenteau and Mrs. Frazier have created lessons that have them teaching like a pirate and have students excited to learn more about the content. With the help of local businesses and parents, many of the supplies used for the transformations have been donated. They couldn't do this without them!

MSBOA STATE Solo and Ensemble Results

Congratulations to the Fraser High School band students that participated in the Michigan School Band and Orchestra Association State Solo and Ensemble Festival on March 18 at Chippewa Valley High School.

Eighteen events qualified at the District Solo and Ensemble Festival, with a total of 17 events participating in the State competition.

Fourteen events received "Superior" First Division ratings, equivalent to the overall grade of an "A," and two events received "Excellent" Second Division ratings. The soloists in grades 10, 11, and 12 compete at a sequenced proficiency level, which include performing a solo piece, memorized scales, and sight reading music they have never seen before. The proficiencies get increasingly more difficult as they progress by grade. For the proficiency ratings, a "Superior" First Division is a score of 85 to 100, and an "Excellent" Second Division is a score of 70 to 84.

Included in the State competition were four chamber ensembles, each comprised of nine to 20 students. The Flute Choir, Brass Ensemble, Saxophone Ensemble, and Percussion Ensemble received First Division ratings. Their talent, hard work, and dedication are exemplary!

If the students receive a First Division rating at the District level, they can compete at the State level. One of the pieces can be the same as the District event, but they must prepare a new piece for the State level. The pieces should still be contrasting in style and in two different languages. The first solo is the same as District Solo & Ensemble, but they must prepare a new piece

for State Solo & Ensemble and perform for a judge at sight reading, singing music they have never seen before. Solos are out of 90 points and sight readings are out of 30 for a total score of 120.

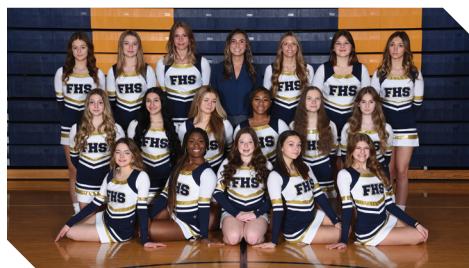


Boys Swim and Dive
