School Safety Is **OUR TOP PRIORITY**

As the district continues to work on enhancing school security, our team is utilizing and applying for eligible grant funds to maximize our budget and remain fiscally responsible. We are always reviewing, practicing, and exploring opportunities to make our buildings as safe as possible. By applying for both competitive and state grants, we have been able to make significant improvements to our campuses.

Recently the district was awarded \$450,000 through the Section 97 Student Safety Improvement grant, as well as a competitive school safety grant from the Michigan State Police for \$250,000.

“We know how important it is to be deliberate in how we spend our taxpayer dollars. By leveraging these grant opportunities with potential bond dollars, we can make safety enhancements that are critical to keeping our schools safe and creating an environment that allows for all children to learn,” said Superintendent Dr. Carrie Wozniak. “Along with these grants, the board is considering a no-tax-rate-increase bond proposal next spring. These one-time grant funds will allow us to leverage potential bond funds in an even more strategic and targeted way.”

Grant Funds Will Enhance Safety, Security

Section 97 funds will be used for several security improvements.

First, all classrooms will be fitted with an interior lock/unlock indicator. During annual school safety meetings, teachers expressed a desire for the indicators

to be sure their door was locked in the event of an emergency.

Second, the Section 97 grant will be used to purchase additional Columbine locks for all remaining doors in our schools. The locks allow any building staff member to lock the door from inside the room. Classrooms already had Columbine locks; the additional locks will secure the remaining doors, which include social workers' offices, conference rooms, and breakout rooms.

The final portion of the Section 97 funds, along with the Michigan State Police grant and a portion of the Childcare Stabilization Grant, will be used to purchase a new state-of-the-art PA system for all schools and the Dooley Center.

“We are always looking for ways to be proactive when it comes to school safety,” said Dan Waters, director of operations, maintenance, and transportation. “The new PA system is one of the best in the country and will give us a quicker response in the event we need to lockdown or lockout.”

The updated PA system will allow for two-way communication with classrooms and between buildings and will make it easier to adjust bells for speed days or early releases. It also allows for emergency notifications such as lockout, lockdown, or evacuation.

Work is expected to begin in the coming weeks and should be completed by the end of the school year.

We are grateful for the support of our community, staff, and students who continue to keep their focus on doing what is best for our school community's safety and well-being.

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CURRICULUM CORNER **LITERACY**

"We are all teachers of literacy." This sentence has been the focus of much of Fraser Public Schools' professional learning sessions this school year. Literacy is defined as the ability to read, write, speak, and listen in a way that lets us communicate effectively and make sense of the world. While teachers often are experts in specific areas of content, literacy weaves its way through all content areas. As educators, it is our responsibility and obligation to seek to produce literate citizens for our society. As we consider Fraser's Portrait of a Graduate, producing students who possess

literacy skills to navigate the world is a top priority across the district.

In that light, on November 8 during our K-12 District Provided Professional Development all staff members participated in activities that highlighted the importance of literacy within their content area. This work was also embedded through the lens of Universal Design for Learning (UDL). UDL is a teaching approach that works to accommodate the needs and abilities of all learners and eliminates unnecessary hurdles in the learning process. After participating in discussions centered on literacy, teachers were given time to

collaborate with their professional learning communities to build lessons and small-group activities with a focus on literacy and differentiation through UDL.

Ultimately, as outlined in our Portrait of a Graduate, the 6Cs Deeper Learning Competencies are qualities that Fraser hopes all our graduates will embody when they walk across the stage and receive that handshake at graduation. The 6Cs are Critical Thinking, Communication, Creativity, Character, Collaboration, and Citizenship. Our continued work in differentiating content through UDL with an embedded focus on literacy is a step in the right direction to achieving that goal.

The Special Education Department at Twain will provide more social-emotional learning opportunities for our students. With this grant, the team will purchase specific sensory materials to create our sensory room.

High-interest books will be purchased with this grant for five English-language arts classroom libraries (both 7th and 8th grades). This will help cultivate a passion for independent reading among students.

It is important for children to learn how to measure. Eventually a young child's sense of measurement develops to include new skills. They build on their abilities to compare and learn to order three or more objects. They come to understand that objects can be measured in different ways, depending on the attribute of interest.



Salk Remembers OUR VETERANS



Salk Elementary's kindergarteners and 3rd graders, together with staff and students from SACC, took the time to learn about what a veteran is and to show respect to the men and women who have served our country. They each created an art project using construction paper to make a flag pattern inside a heart. Altogether, the students made 192 signs to give to veterans. This was SACC students' seventh year honoring veterans.

Ms. Sarah and Ms. Sally then delivered the heart signs to the Vietnam Veterans of America, located on 15 Mile Road, where they were very grateful to receive the signs to distribute to veterans on Veterans Day.



Edison Immersed in LITERACY

First-grade students at Edison Elementary have been working on literacy this fall. Thanks to the help of Mrs. Kristin Reilly, the students were assessed and placed in groups based on their reading instruction needs. Each student receives small-group instruction using the Differentiated Reading Instruction model. The students love the hands-on small-group learning, and everyone feels comfortable learning in their zone. The 1st graders' progress is monitored throughout the process, and they are moved into new groups as they grow. The skills-based groups are currently working on alphabet knowledge, letter sounds, letter patterns, and blends/digraphs. All groups also study the Fry word list.

While students are working in small groups with Mrs. Cabe or Mrs. Krajewski, the rest of the students work through a reading choice board. Some of the students' favorites are poetry reading, listening to books on EPIC, reading books, taking comprehension quizzes on Raz-Kids, partner reading, and various word work activities. The students are motivated and on task because the work is driven by their own preferences. They have had a trimester of really hard work in 1st grade, and the teachers and students are so proud!



GLOBAL CITIZENSHIP

Mark Twain's 6th-grade students visited Camp Howell. While on this trip, students were introduced to the concept of global citizenship during an activity called Global Village.

The goal of this activity is to learn about the causes and effects of hunger and poverty. The 6th graders were able to experience how different cultures live around the world and what challenges they face.

Once back in the classroom, they learned that 1.1 billion people on Earth live on less than \$1 a day. Students have been researching to learn what this means in terms of education, health, and overall well-being. They learned about a small village in Peña Blanca, Guatemala, and the different things the people who live there go through and how they make a living. Twain's 6th graders have really shown a lot of empathy through their exploration of people who live differently from them.

GROWING IN GRATITUDE

Disney Elementary's kindergarten students spent the month of November focusing on what it means to have gratitude and be thankful. Their PBIS theme of the month was gratitude – showing appreciation for others and returning kindness. There are many things that we can be thankful for, including our families, teachers, friends, food to eat, toys that we love, and so much more. When we grow with gratitude, we become more understanding of the needs and feelings of others. We learn to appreciate what we have and are more likely to become healthy, optimistic adults. CALCULATING Area and Perimeter



Mrs. Collins' 4th-grade math classroom at Emerson Elementary was transformed into an area and perimeter construction zone. The 4th graders had to measure their "blueprints" and calculate the area and perimeter of rectangles and other more complex shapes. They got to practice their measuring, addition, multiplication, and geometry skills, as well as their teamwork and communication skills, while working in small groups. The students had fun and prepared themselves for their upcoming Math Module on multiplication and division.

ROSEVILLE FIRE DEPARTMENT VISITS DOOLEY

Squeals of delight were in the air at the Dooley Center thanks to a visit from the Roseville Fire Department for Fire Prevention Month.



Students were so excited to see firefighters and a fire truck at their school. The children learned safety awareness tips and got an up-close-and-personal look at the fire truck.

Students were taught to get out and stay out of their house if there's a fire; to call 911 in an emergency; and to stop, drop, and roll if their clothes are on fire. The children were able to see what was inside the different compartments of the fire truck and what the firefighters used each item for. Most of all, Dooley staff hope this visit started a conversation about firefighters being our friends and other important fire safety rules.

Salk Elementary Student Council members met with their co-sponsors, 2nd-grade teacher Mrs. Jill Sutter and 5th-grade teacher Ms. Kelli Provost, to brainstorm ways to help the victims of Hurricane Ian. Each grade level had its own container outside the main office, and throughout the week of October 17, students from grades K-6 and Salk's SSLI classes contributed to the War. Pennies and dollar bills in each container added points to that grade level's total, and all silver coins deducted points from that grade level's amount.

One could sense the buzz of excitement as the week progressed and the height of the coins in each container grew taller and taller. Many grade levels strategized throughout the week, as they tried to determine which grade levels needed more silver added to their containers. Ms. Provost recalled overhearing a student in the hallway saying, "I don't even care if we win, I feel good just because I donated and am helping the people in Florida." In the end, Salk's 5th graders came out on top with the victory and earned a grade-level pizza party provided by the Student Council.

In total, the Salk Seahawks raised over \$2,550 for Hurricane Ian relief. STORY CHAMPS!



The kindergarten students at Eisenhower Elementary are doing an amazing job with their Story Champs program and have become great storytellers! The students love to share these wonderful stories with a partner and a Champ Checker.

The Champ Checker helps the listener keep track of the story elements as the speaker retells the story. The children retell the main character, setting, problem, feeling after the problem, action to fix the problem, ending of the story, and how the character feels at the end of the story. STUDENTS BUILD AN OFRENDA

In Language Acquisition, students at Richards Middle School built an ofrenda, or altar, for Day of the Dead.

Ofrendas are shrines built to remember and honor close loved ones who have died. They are a way to keep the memory of that person alive through the annual tradition of remembering what they looked like and what they loved to do, eat, and drink.

The class offered our staff members an opportunity to honor a passed loved one as well by taking submissions to be added to the ofrenda. This holiday is recognized and celebrated on November 1 in many countries across Latin America as a celebration of life and for family and friends who have passed.

4th-Grade PALEONTOLOGISTS

Fourth-grade students at Eisenhower Elementary have been learning about landforms in social studies and about how the Earth's surface has changed over time in science, which contributes to the formation of these landforms.

Students used digital media to design their own Book Creator projects on landforms. They also used hands-on materials to

create models of the layers of the Earth representing fossils in the deeper layers. This demonstrated how paleontologists use this evidence to decipher how the Earth has changed based on what organisms used to live there.

A celebrated tradition at the end of this unit is when students create their own fossil kits that they may take home and keep.





5th-Grade Battle of THE BOOKS

Emerson Elementary students will be participating in a 5th-Grade Battle of the Books through the Clinton-Macomb Public Library. Four teams of 3-5 students will be reading a total of 12 books and will work together to answer a total of 50 questions at the event in March. In addition, students will be working in teams to complete practice questions during meetings at school to prepare. This is the second year that Emerson 5th graders have participated in this event. They have 21 5th graders participating this year!
