Fraser Public Schools Places **Bond Proposal on May 2 Ballot** NO CHANGE IN CURRENT TAX RATE IF APPROVED

At the January 23 regular meeting, the Board of Education unanimously voted to place a \$59 million bond proposal on the May 2 ballot.

The bond will provide revenue for updates and renovations at all of Fraser's schools. If approved by voters, the current tax rate will not change.

The bond proposal is designed to continue enhancing security improvements already being implemented at all schools and facilities. It will also update building infrastructure, including roofs and exterior doors, mechanical and electrical systems, parking lots, and walkways. Finally, the bond will provide revenue for improving site drainage, constructing an addition to the concession stand at Fraser High School, and replacing equipment and school buses that have reached the end of their useful life. The bond proposal will not require an increase in the current tax rate. The tax rate for bonds that are expiring will simply be extended.

"We presented a draft bond proposal through a focus panel process that included community members, staff, business leaders, elected officials, parents, and students," said Dr. Carrie Wozniak, superintendent. "We also sought opinions about the bond proposal via an online survey that was open to residents of our community. The feedback we received overwhelmingly supported the proposed bond projects and encouraged the Board of Education to place this bond proposal on the May ballot."

CURRICULUM CORNER LITERACY

In December's Curriculum Corner, a renewed focus on literacy across all content areas was discussed. Since then, Fraser Public Schools has continued to focus on literacy instruction at the elementary level by investing in professional learning for all teachers. Our lower elementary teachers have all attended or are currently attending learning sessions on literacy instruction at the Macomb Intermediate School District, Concurrently, our upper elementary teachers are being trained here in the district by our teacher consultants who are experts in literacy instruction. This embedded focus on professional learning around early

literacy reinforces our focus as a district on the importance of this skill.

At the elementary level, our teachers focus on differentiating reading instruction through the readers workshop model. Our teachers use multiple data points to group students in a variety of formats to ensure all students are getting what they need to become proficient readers. Our model of reading instruction is not a "one size fits all" approach; rather, it focuses on giving students what they need when they need it. The professional learning and resources teachers are currently receiving will serve to reinforce that goal of differentiated, personalized instruction. There are many ways that families can support this focus on early literacy at home. The most important and impactful thing families can do is to read with their children as often as possible. The research shows that children who read for at least 20 minutes a day at home have an increased exposure to vocabulary, word patterns, and ultimately perform better on schoolbased assessments and standardized tests. Families who support the reading instruction that occurs during the school day play an important role in their child's academic development and success. Board Secretary Linda Corbat Retires

After nearly 12 years of service to the students, staff, and community of Fraser Public Schools, Board Secretary Linda Corbat retired from her position on January 31.

Her family, friends, and several past board members filled the Idea Lab for her last board meeting on January 23.

"I don't know what to say... it has been an honor – a true honor – to serve," Mrs. Corbat said. "I know the board is in good hands, I have been trained by some wonderful people along the way and have made some wonderful friends. That's what I leave here with: the friendships, the memories, and seeing the kids succeed – that's what it's all about."

Board President Scott Wallace presented Mrs. Corbat with a plaque to commemorate her service.

"I can tell you – and many others in the room can say the same – most of us would not be able to do the job we do if you were not here," Mr. Wallace said. "You do an awful lot behind the scenes that people don't see, and they are very big shoes to fill. On behalf of everyone on the board, thank you for your service."

Mrs. Corbat joined the board in 2011 and served as trustee until 2016, when she became the board secretary.

"Linda has been a huge part of my experience here in Fraser



Public Schools," Superintendent Dr. Carrie Wozniak said. "She's not just been a colleague; she's also been a friend and a valuable sounding board. One of my favorite things about Linda is the quiet leadership she has demonstrated over these past 12 years."

The Board is now accepting applications to fill the vacancy and expects to appoint a new board member in February.

The **BENICE** Club



The Be Nice Club at FHS and RMS is more than just a club encouraging students to be polite.

It is a student-led club that focuses on mental health and encourages students to notice when someone may be in crisis and how to take action. Be Nice, originating in Grand Rapids, is a Mental Health Foundation geared toward empowering youth through their researched-based program. The acronym "NICE" stands for:

- Notice what is right or different about others.
- **Invite** yourself to reach out if you notice others are struggling.
- **Challenge** stigma about mental health and challenge that person to get help from an adult.
- Empower yourself and others with knowledge and resources.

Juniors Adreanna Barney, Alexandra Nichol, Kailey Nordstrom, and Noah Tonn make up the executive board of the Be Nice Club and have gone full force into expanding the club and their message. The club is already 40 members strong. Club advisors at the high school are Heidi Impellizzeri, school social worker, Stacy Kalpin, school counselor, and Frank Ragona, school social worker. The group at FHS kick-started the school year with an all-school "Stand Up" activity that brought awareness around challenges that youth are dealing with, helping students understand they are not alone, and that help is available. Based on the anonymous surveys, 74% of FHS students identified that mental health has affected them or someone they love.

An upcoming event open to all Fraser students K-12 and their families will be a Winter Wellness night that will take place February 24 at the FHS Fra Café. Through this event, the club wants to bring resources, tools, and awareness of mental health. They will be bringing multiple community resources, including CARE of Southeast Michigan, Certified Therapy Dogs, and a local mental health clinic, to name a few.

Club members will be attending an Eastside Mental Health Symposium at Royal Oak High School in March, where they will connect with other local Be Nice clubs and learn ways to incorporate peer mentoring as well as other school initiatives related to mental health. Finally, the club would also like to hold a Mental Health Week in May where "spirit days" will revolve around awareness for mental health stigma and tools to combat it. They hope to end the week with a Walk-A-Thon that will raise funds for the club and promote mental health awareness as a community.

TRANSFERRING ENERGY

In Science, Emerson Elementary 4th-grade students are learning about energy and the transfer of energy from one object to another. They recently experimented with "Bumper Coasters," which allowed them to learn why the first hill of a roller coaster is always the highest.



They also learned how height energy allowed their marbles to get bumped and continue through the rest of the coaster track when the bumper marbles were on the tops of the hills, but not when they were at the bottoms of the valleys. They worked to put together their tracks, persevered through their experiments not going the way they wanted, and collaborated with their group members to figure out more about energy transfer in their bumper coaster system.





Twain 6th-Grade Students Appreciate Van Gogh

The 6th-grade students at Mark Twain experienced a once-in-a-lifetime tour at the Detroit Institute of Arts to see the world-famous *Van Gogh in America* exhibit. They saw and learned about 74 of his 900+ pieces and couldn't believe that his works were not appreciated until after his death.

Sixth-grader Andrea Maceri said, "I thought it was really cool that we were able to see the actual real paintings by Van Gogh. It was cool to see all the people come to see his work. Especially, knowing that no one cared about them when Van Gogh was alive."

The students saw some of his most famous works, including



Starry Night Over the Rhône, often known as Starry Night. The 6th graders couldn't believe that these were the actual canvases that Van Gogh himself created. They were also interested in learning about the various techniques he used, and were surprised to see that he created many black-and-white pieces, including lithographs.

They had many great conversations upon returning to school about his works, and it seems most of the students liked his oil paintings the best. Some of their favorites were his paintings of olive fields and various paintings of flowers. They also really loved his oil on canvas called *The Bedroom.* They thought it was interesting to learn that this was the second version he painted after the original was partially damaged in a flood.

The 6th graders had many good things to say about this experience, and their teachers were happy they were able to take them.

CELEBRATING Martin Luther King Jr.

Kindergarten students at Eisenhower Elementary celebrated Martin Luther King Jr. Day by creating "I have a dream" headbands.

The students learned about the importance of Martin Luther King Jr. and his dream.

They read many stories and did activities to celebrate his life. The children enjoyed learning about Martin Luther King's important message. They also discussed many kind acts that they can do during their daily lives.



CPR/AED Certification at Fraser High School

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Fraser High School second semester Physical Education B classes participated in their PE/CPR Competency in January. The Physical Education A curriculum (first semester) included an online module, Student CPR (ProTrainings). When the course was completed, each student received a certificate and the option to continue to become CPR/AED certified.

During the second semester, the Physical Education B classes and the CTE (Career Technical Education) department will work in coordination, along



with teacher Mrs. Marti Vaneenenaam-Iwanicki, to help students become certified. Mrs. Van-I will enlist her Sports Medicine students to lead the review stations for the PE students. This is a valuable partnership that enhances the students' learning.



Kindergartners are **Readers and Writers!**

Through partner reading and writing, kindergartners build their confidence and boost their connection to the curriculum. As part of Disney Elementary's English



During partner reading, students take turns reading one of the books they have learned how to read during guided reading. Partners follow along and give feedback.

Language Arts routine, students are given the opportunity to both read and write with a partner. During this time, students are encouraged to notice things their classmates did well and offer ideas for support. While observing students in pairs, these are some of the statements you may hear: "You found all the star words!" "Your story is like my story," or "Remember to add a feeling to your story!" When working in pairs, students take ownership of their learning and contribute to not only their success, but the success of their partner.

Prior to beginning partner work, the students establish expectations of what being a good partner looks like. If you are the listener, you are looking at your partner, sitting still, and noticing some great things your partner is doing. If

you are the speaker or reader, you are using a loud enough voice to be heard, looking at your partner, and staying focused on your work. The skills they are gaining in this area will support them throughout their entire educational career!

UNLOCKING Students' Potentials

During the 22-23 school year, 7th- and 8th-grade students participated in Xello 'X'ploration at Richards Middle School on early dismissal days.



The RMS staff created an adjusted schedule that enables all students to participate in Xello "X"ploration for the day.

The Xello program puts RMS Knights at the center of their college and career readiness experience. The students document their journey as they build self-knowledge, explore post-secondary options, create plans, and continually reassess as they acquire new knowledge, skills, and experiences.

Xello-About Me: Career Matchmaker has 39 questions. These questions have students thinking critically about their interests and ranking them on a scale of "Like Very Much" to "Dislike Very Much." Their answers are weighed against aspects of each career to determine the strength of a match; the higher they rank an interest and the more central its corresponding aspect is to a career, the stronger the match.

The 7th graders have completed the following lessons in Xello-About Me: Career Matchmaker, Personality Styles, Learning Styles, Decision Making, and Careers & Time Management. The 8th graders have completed the About Me: Career Matchmaker, Personality Styles, Learning Styles, FHS CTE course review, and Course Planner 9th Grade exploration.

The RMS "X"ploration in Xello goal is to unlock every student's potential by opening their eyes to future possibilities and equipping for their future.



CHARACTER COUNTS at Edison Elementary



At Edison Elementary, students are constantly being recognized for their positive character traits. Each week during the school year, students are acknowledged for specific traits such as optimism, bravery, gratitude, and kindness. At the end of each month, all the winners for that month gather during lunchtime to celebrate with Mrs. Wiegand. Students are then given a small Edison trinket, a treat, a certificate, and are acknowledged in the weekly newsletter. "Our students look forward to finding out which trait they are going to get recognized for during the year. When their names are announced, students are all smiles as they report to the office for their pictures. Their excitement is contagious," explained Mrs. Wiegand.

In addition to recognizing all students for specific positive character traits throughout the year, the PBIS team at Edison plans a monthly incentive for students who demonstrate safety, respect, responsibility, and motivation throughout the month. The culminating event each month provides positive reinforcement for students at Edison. Their monthly rewards have consisted of a bounce house, short films, and a snowball fight. We are proud of our Eagles as they continue to shine!

Creative Thinking with **Stop Motion Studio**

Students at Salk and Emerson in the 4th, 5th, and 6th grades flexed their creative muscles in their 21st Century classes.

They used the app Stop Motion Studio to create their own movies.

Students were encouraged to use different manipulates, like Play-Doh, Legos, pipe cleaners, figurines, popsicle sticks, etc., to produce their movies. They worked collaboratively and learned more about the stopmotion movie-making process through trial and error.

"One of the best parts was working as a team to create a great movie," 5th grader, Thomas Felcyn explained.

It teaches them to determine how large a room is, how far away a desk is, or which way to move. Geometry allows students to connect mapping objects in the classroom to real-world contexts regarding direction and place.

Understanding of spatial relationships is also considered important in the role of problem solving and higher-order thinking skills.

When they finished a movie, students posted their creation in their digital portfolio so classmates could see and celebrate their hard work.

Fourth-grade student Robin Lippincott exclaimed, "It's a lot of fun using Stop Motion. I'm excited about using it at home with my materials too!"

Students will continue to be challenged to use creative thinking and to have growth mindsets in their 21st Century classes.



Fourth-grade students at Eisenhower Elementary have been learning about geometry. They have learned the differences between lines, line segments, rays, parallel lines, and perpendicular lines. Recently, they learned how to use protractors to measure angles, how to make specific angles, and play Rocket Angles and Alien Angles.





Traveling Back in Time

Eisenhower Elementary 2nd-grade students took a trip to the Troy Historic Village. In social studies, they have been learning about history and how things have changed over time. Students traveled back to the 1800s, where they attended a oneroom schoolhouse and visited a general store. They learned about the many chores of children their age who had to make their own toys and clothes, help on their family farm, and attend school with students of all ages. Each student was able to make their own cup and ball toy, and a candle to take home.



6th Grade Book Tasting

Sixth-grade students at Disney Elementary participated in a book tasting at "Cafe Genre." They were presented with numerous books from six different genres: historical fiction, mystery, biography, fantasy, nonfiction, and graphic novels. As groups moved throughout the cafe, they were given time to preview books from each genre. After previewing, they were able to rate their selections, discuss their likes and dislikes with the group, and share their thoughts with the class.

This activity gave students an opportunity to explore different genres and books they might not typically reach for. It also allowed them to have meaningful discussions with classmates about various books and possibly discover something new that they would enjoy reading!

CYBER PATRIOTS



Cyber Patriots is a Cyber Defense national competition that puts teams of high school and middle school students into a position to manage the network of a small company.

Teams are tasked with finding and fixing cybersecurity vulnerabilities. Approximately 2,000 high school teams and 539 middle school teams participated in three rounds of competition. Teams from Fraser High School and, for the first time, Richards Middle School, competed. Richards Middle School was one of five middle school teams from Michigan.

The teams had an opportunity to train on demos provided by the Air Force Association (AFA).

The experience students received from competing is priceless – from teambuilding to communicating, researching, problem solving, and even applying new strategies they just developed. Students learn valuable lessons in work ethics, as well as cybersecurity techniques that can be used to protect themselves in their lives, both digitally and physically.







Our youngest learners were able to fully embrace the holiday season when the conductor of the Polar Express, Dooley Director Melissa Laseck, paid a surprise visit to the Dooley Center. Using their train tickets, students walked the train tracks until they were immersed in a winter wonderland where they drank hot cocoa and watched a snippet of *The Polar Express*.



High School State Solo and Ensemble Festival participation offers students the opportunity to express themselves through creating beauty, building self-confidence, and to be affirmed as a singer. Performers learn from the mentoring of an adjudicator and through preparation in a solo or ensemble event, and students gain insights into the music as they continue their musical journey.

Soloists must sing two selections of a contrasting nature. Soloists must perform from memory to receive a final determination. Following performance, each soloist proceeds to the sight-reading room. Only the soloist's director is allowed into the sightreading room and may instruct the soloist. Prior to singing the passage, the soloist is given time to study the exercise. Each exercise is eight measures long. The adjudicator establishes the key as the soloist requests starting pitch and/or tonic.





Scores are calculated by multiplying the performance judge's score by three and adding the sight-reading judge's score.
