Growing Leaders and Building Capacity

As we continue to collaborate and grow leadership capacity within Fraser Public Schools, a new districtwide team has been created.

The Universal Design for Learning (UDL) District Leadership Team brings together teacher leaders and school administrators who are key stakeholders from leadership groups at both our school and central office teams. This includes team members from:

- Building School Improvement Teams
 Michigan Integrated Continuous Improvement Process (MICIP)
- Building Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS) Teams
- Building Positive Behavior Intervention and Support (PBIS) Teams
- Building UDL and 21st Century Coaches

More than 50 of our school leaders have been focusing on our district mission to

Innovate. Learn. Lead. The goal of this group is to focus on:

- Integrating the UDL, PBIS, School Improvement, and MTSS frameworks across the district so that all students are prepared to excel in a complex, interconnected, changing world.
- Supporting staff to grow in their knowledge and application of UDL, PBIS, and MTSS.

Four meetings will be held throughout the 2023-24 school year. Two of these meetings have already occurred, in September and November. At these meetings, building leaders have focused on:

• Collaboration – Sharing out the work of each leadership team

Dear Fraser Families,

As we move into 2024, we are continuing the process of creating our next strategic plan. Our current plan

CURRICULUM CORNER digital sat

The SAT is an exam used by most colleges and universities to assist in making decisions regarding admissions.

Additionally, it is a measure used by the State of Michigan to collect proficiency data of students in the areas of English language arts and mathematics.

Starting in 2024, the SAT has transitioned to a digital format. Our students who take the PSAT 8/9, PSAT 10, and SAT will experience a new version of the state assessment during our testing window in April. The new version differs in many key areas compared to its previous version:

- **Presentation** The new test is digital instead of paper-and-pencil.
- Length Students will spend just over two hours on the assessment instead of the three hours that the previous version took. Additionally, there are fewer questions and more time per question.
- Question Variation The digital SAT utilizes adaptive questioning. Students will have two modules to complete. The questions given to them in the second module are based upon their responses to the first. This is different than the old system where all students were given the same question set.
- Format Reading portions will be shorter and related to a single question or two, as opposed to being a long reading paired up with multiple questions. For math, students will be asked multiple-choice as well as

fill-in-the-blank questions. A benefit to the math test is that the entire assessment allows the use of a calculator.

• Digital Resources – Students will have access to mark-up tools, graphing calculators, zoom-in-and-out features, and reference material.

Fraser Public Schools is aware of these changes and has plans in place to assist students in getting acclimated to the new system. Our IT team will be adding the necessary app and updates to student computers to be prepared for the test in April. Further, our staff has already begun discussions on how they can assist students in being comfortable with the new format. We will be aiding students in accessing practice materials as well as dedicating some time in school to working with some of that material.

Parents can learn more about how to help their child with preparing for the SAT by reviewing the **Parents Guide** from College Board.

We encourage you to help your child prepare for and understand the importance of being confident when it comes time to take the Spring SAT on April 10 and 11. If you have questions regarding the new SAT model, please reach out to your child's school.

Edison 6th Graders Participate in **National Stock Market Game**

Edison 6th graders are competing in the National Stock Market Game, an online simulation of the global capital markets that engages students grades 4-12 in the world of economics, investing, and personal finance and prepares them for financially independent futures. More than 600,000 students take part every school year across all 50 states.

Our 6th graders are gaining the fundamental understanding of investing while exploring real-world skills and practice in math, English language arts, and social studies. "Ms. Lindsay and I appreciate the crosscurricular integration and that we are covering over 15 6th grade math standards alone," explained Mr. McGuffey.

With the SIFMA Stock Market Game, each team of students works together to create and manage a virtual investment portfolio of real-world stocks, bonds, and mutual funds. Each team is responsible for researching

and evaluating potential investments and ultimately deciding what to do with their \$100,000 in virtual cash. "We get the benefits and excitement of trading real stocks at real prices, without risking real money," one 6th grader chimed in. "I even got my dad to use real money to buy a stock I researched. I love this game!"

Digital Hall Pass System Implemented

Simplifying the hall pass process and proving a common system for student movement around both Fraser High School and Richards Middle School led administrators to implement SmartPass, a digital pass system.

SmartPass was introduced in mid-January and officially started January 16. So far it is making a difference.

"We expected an adjustment period to this new system, but so far students and staff are really embracing it," said Fraser High School Principal Ryan Sines. "I'm hearing a lot of positive feedback that this system is working." Another key benefit of SmartPass is the ability to see where all students are in the building in the event of an emergency. It also provides data on the frequency of pass requests and how long students are out of the classrooms.

Students request the digital pass from their district-issued device. They can request the pass for immediate use or for a future time. Destinations are prefilled for ease of use. Teachers then approve the requests from their device. This cuts down on disruptions in the teaching and learning processes.

The system also considers the amount of passes already in use, which prevents overbooking of common areas such as restrooms.

At FHS, SmartPass will also simplify the process for traveling during SMART hour.



District Partners with the Y of Metro Detroit for SACC Services

For many elementary families, before and after-school care are a necessary part of their day. But for the last several years, the district has struggled to fully staff the program.

In order to provide a consistent program at all six elementary schools, the district has entered into a partnership with the YMCA of Metropolitan Detroit to provide SACC services for the 2024-25 school year. No changes will be made for the remainder of this school year.

For the last several years, it has become increasingly difficult to staff the program at all six schools. Thankfully, several teachers stepped up to help cover the open spaces. However, when there is teacher professional development (on half days and early release days) the district must cancel afternoon SACC at several buildings. District leadership and the board of education heard from many parents frustrated by the repeated closures and felt this move was necessary.

Next year, the Y will handle all aspects of the program, from staffing to registration, billing, and providing structured activities to children in the program. All current SACC employees have the opportunity to become a Y employee and continue working in our schools.

Will SACC still be available at every school?

Yes, SACC will still be available at all six elementary schools. The Y will provide staffing and **structured activities** at our schools.

When will this take effect?

We are working with the Y now to secure licensing in our spaces. We will transition to the Y partnership in the beginning of the 2024-25 school year.

Will the Y partnership cost more?

Yes, the cost of SACC will increase for the upcoming year. However, the district will be paying half of the increased cost to help families adjust to the new rates. For example, the current daily morning rate is \$6.00 per student. The Y rate is \$8.50. Therefore, the district will cover \$1.25 of the increase, and families will pay \$7.25/day next year for morning SACC.

What discounts are available?

There is a discount for families who use both morning and afternoon SACC on the same day.

The Y offers a 10% sibling discount for every child enrolled after the first child.

Families who qualify for free or reduced meals and/or receive assistance from DHS are eligible to apply for the financial assistance program.

More information will continue to be shared throughout the next six months.

Bridge to Reading PROGRAM



Kindergarten students at Eisenhower Elementary are enjoying their wonderful Bridge to Reading program and all the engaging activities that go along with it. Some of the activities included are finger blending to sound out words, learning new nursery rhymes, bright colored posters to interact with for letters and sounds, and they each have their own set of spell tabs to create words.

Students are seen in the photo searching for pictures that have the same beginning letter sound in the picture. The program offers a variety of different activities and lessons each day, and it keeps the kindergarten students excited and engaged while learning!

The Bridge Reading Program is designed to teach pre-reading skills and basic reading concepts. Its objective is to form a bridge between the level of functioning at which the students are capable and that required through the addition of gestural cues, logographs, and icons.

This hands-on way of learning is helping to guide students' writing and give them the confidence they need to grow as readers and writers. It's amazing how many fun learning opportunities a good book can provide!




