CONGRATS CLASS OF 2018



Parents, grandparents, friends and siblings filled the auditorium on Saturday, June 9 to celebrate the 88th Commencement of Fraser High School. This year, a total of 349 students earned their diplomas, many of whom then walked across the stage at Mt. Zion in Clarkston.

Fraser High School bands, under the direction of Mr. James Rodgers, played "Processional Fanfare" and "Pomp and Circumstance" as

students filed into the auditorium. Senior Miranda Cole sang the national anthem. The Fraser High School choirs performed "Ocean and Stars" and "I'll Remember You."

Current and Former FHS interim principals Mr. Tom Heethuis and Dr. Rick Repicky addressed the crowd, as well as salutatorians Eva Steepe and Stevenchoukry Razzouk and valedictorian Katrina Sanchez.

"The world is changing, so you better change with it," Dr. Repicky told the graduates. "Not in terms of the values your parents and families have taught you, but in terms of the skills you need to develop. Things are changing faster than ever before, and these changes will only accelerate as time goes on."

The students reminded their classmates about the impact one change can have on their life, as well as how their life can impact the world around them.

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DR. RICHARDS RETIRES

After 13 years of leadership in Fraser Public Schools, Superintendent Dr. David Richards will retire at the end of the month.

Dr. Richards joined the Fraser Family as principal at Fraser High School in the fall of 2005. Dr. Richards was the catalyst to many changes at FHS: starting the Fraser Family Tailgate, opening the Fra Café and introducing the Senior Walk as a final sendoff for graduates.

Five years later, in 2010, Dr. Richards took over the top spot in our district following the retirement of Superintendent Dr. Rick Repicky. His visionary leadership, combined with the passage of a bond in 2011, started our district's digital transformation. Learning was revolutionized for Fraser students in 2012, when the district purchased iPads for students and launched the State of Michigan's largest 1:1 initiative. This step allowed for students to



own their learning, which could now happen at any time and in any place.

Dr. Richards has worked tirelessly during his tenure to fight for public education and do what's best for Fraser's kids. He has invited countless educators and elected officials to Fraser to see our learning transformation firsthand.

Dr. Richards' last day will be June 30. Current Assistant Superintendent Ms. Carrie Wozniak has been named as his successor.

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"You don't have to be a doctor to save lives, you don't have to be a teacher to teach others. You just have to embrace your unique talents to try to improve the world around...I am so excited to see who we will become," said co-salutatorian Eva Steepe.

Co-salutatorian Stevenchoukry Razzouk urged his fellow graduates to find the meaning behind their future decisions.

"We spent our high school days just like we did math class — figuring out these unknowns, all these X's in our lives...But is just knowing what we want to be enough? Or do we need to know why? To get an exact point on a graph, you need the X and the Y. And so in life, you need to know the unknowns and the why," he said.

Finally, valedictorian Katrina Sanchez addressed the crowd. Inspired by a quote from Gandhi, she said today is the perfect day to make a change for the better.

"We have right now to choose to make a change. We have right now to make a better version of ourselves," she said. "By bettering ourselves, we're essentially bettering this world, and there's no greater time than today to begin doing so."

Superintendent Dr. Dave Richards addressed the crowd of more than 3,400 last.

He echoed the sentiments of others, and reminded the students about the power or their choices. "Always keep in mind one of the greatest opportunities you have as a leader is the power of influence. It's either a positive power or a negative one; it's always your choice. I hope you choose to be positive. The way we think, the thoughts that we allow to consume our minds, have a tremendous impact on how we view the world. Choose to be positive."

Missing from the ceremony were 12 of the 13 graduating seniors who are members of the varsity baseball team. The team won the district championship, and the regional semifinal game was scheduled for Saturday morning. Athletic Director Shane Redshaw and Dr. Richards put together a ceremony Friday afternoon for the boys to receive their diplomas.

The ceremony was held at the FHS media center, and featured the same professional photographers and recognitions as Saturday's ceremony.

Coach Dave Kuppe called each name as several members of the Board of Education passed out diplomas and posed for pictures.

FHS STUDENTS FINISH EARLY COLLEGE OF MACOMB PROGRAM


Fifteen Fraser High School students completed their associate degree from Macomb Community College through the Early College of Macomb program this year.

Disney Elementary Showcases Academics

Every year, 6th-grade students at Disney Elementary pick topics based on their interests to further research throughout the school year. Their teachers. Mrs. Stephanie McGuffey, Mrs. Sara Loveridge and Mrs. Michelle Gee, then help them align those interests with a math module and connect them to reading and writing objectives.

Once students have their topics and have made their connections, they are categorized based on which Career and Technical Education program it aligned with.

"For example, one student in the interest inventory said he wanted to learn more about geology, which fits with Module 5 - Area, Surface Area and Volume," said

Mrs. McGuffey. "He had to research his topic using Informational Research — writing and reading using credible sources and fit into the STEM CTE program."

Projects also had to include cross-curricular connections and real-world applications. Students were driven to participate because they were based on what they wanted to learn more about or what they were already interested in. On May 31, students held an academic showcase to present their research and findings to parents, teachers and fellow students.

"This effort supported self-actualization and exposure to some programs they will encounter and plan for as they prepare for high school," said Mrs. McGuffey.

HOT AIR BALLOON INTRODUCES EDISON ELEMENTARY STUDENTS TO PHYSICS

While it may have been too windy to fill up the RE/MAX hot air balloon, students and staff at Edison Elementary still had the opportunity to learn about the science behind how hot air rises.

RE/MAX of Southeastern Michigan visited the school and partially inflated the balloon with a fan so students could see just how large it was. The pilot then disconnected the basket and allowed each class to come up to see it up close.

The program is designed to teach the physics of why hot air rises, how hot air becomes less dense and what happens to the air molecules during this process. RE/MAX also sent grade-level appropriate experiments and supplies to further enhance the lesson, as well as small prizes for each student.





DESTINATION: IMAGINATION TEAM COMPETES AT GLOBAL FINALS

In just the second year of having a Destination Imagination team at Eisenhower Elementary, a group of students competed against teams from all over the world in the DI Global Finals. HANDS-ON LEARNING AT TWAIN

During their living science unit, kindergartners at Mark Twain Elementary took part in a hands-on experience. They watched the process of metamorphosis as a caterpillar turned into a Painted Lady butterfly.

Students learned that besides being beautiful, butterflies are essential to the pollination of plants. Some species also provide a natural form of pest control. Students also learned that a change in butterfly behavior could indicate future loss of habitat for other animals.

The children also examined worms. They studied the parts of a worm and learned earthworms help break down organic matter into soil and are an important indicator of the health of the soil. They can also be used directly as

a "tool" to determine if certain toxins are present, by measuring the timing of their response to a touch.

"It was an exciting experience each step of the way," said Kindergarten Teacher Mrs. Tracey Delicato.

4th-Grade Students Get Out

and Learn

The 4th-grade students at Eisenhower Elementary received a Get Out and Learn scholarship through the Huron-Clinton Metroparks. This scholarship covered the full cost of a field trip to the Lake St. Clair Metropark Nature Center.

The Nature Center features displays on wetlands, waterfowl, live animals and the historical use of the area by French voyagers. Students explored the wetlands, walked the nature trails, and learned about the native plants and animals of our state.



The Metropark school program provides environmental, cultural and natural science literacy. All programs support the Michigan Science Standards curriculum in content, methodology and technology use.

SEEING WHAT THEY LEARNED

Emerson Elementary 3rd-grade students traveled the Clinton River with the Great Lakes Education Program. Students collected water samples, learned how to tie nautical knots, charted the Great Lakes and discovered how waste affects the water.

The program encompassed their study of Michigan, the English Language Arts units on recycling and wastes, as well their study of organisms in science which focused on wetlands, invasive species and how organisms play a roll in the health of our waters.

"It was a great experience had by all — including our awesome chaperones," said 3rd-grade teacher, Mrs. Lea Thompson.



CREATIVE CURRICULUM AT CHILD CARE

The Early Childhood Care Program at Dooley is much more than a drop-in childcare program for families. It utilizes childhood education through "Creative Curriculum," which focuses on hands-on exploration.

This spring, children planted bean seeds in plastic bags without dirt and hung them in the window. They also planted grass seed and flowers. While caring for and watering the seedlings, the children observed that some sprouted sooner than others and that some plants grow faster than others.

"The children enjoy caring for our plants in our growing center by watering them. We are learning the parts of the plants and how delicate they are as young seedlings," said Mrs. Tracey Pastrick, Childcare Aide.





WRAPPING UP SCIENCE

Emerson Elementary 5th-grade students were treated to a special presentation from The Little Creatures Company to wrap up their science unit on classifying animals. The presenter showed and discussed nine live animals with the students. He brought with him a python, giant snapping turtle, two lizards, two frogs, alligator, tarantula and hissing cockroach. They learned more about how our local government works and even participated in a mock City Council meeting, where students passed a rule that Emerson students can have recess all day on Thursdays.

After the mock council meeting, students toured Fraser Public Safety and learned more about the invaluable service they provide to our community.





A Flag Day Lesson

Nearly 80 6th-grade students from Salk Elementary were invited to the Corporal Neil Reid VFW post in Fraser for a day of U.S. flag appreciation, recognition and proper retirement (disposal). This is the third year teacher Ms. Kelly Jenks has taken her students on a field trip and lesson on patriotism.

The students toured the facility and visited with veterans from WWII, Korea, Vietnam, the Cold War, Iraq and Afghanistan. They were served The General pizza for lunch, and part of the proceeds from the sale of the pizza supports veterans causes.

After lunch students were shown the Friends and Families Path of Honor and the veterans explained the story and meaning behind it. Military and Fraser Public Safety Department vehicles were brought in and the students explored them with the direction of the drivers. "We were honored to work for such a worthy cause," said Mrs. Scopas. "The students loved it and were invited back to work the harvest in October!"








Boys & Girls Track

During the 2018 season, the boys finished 2nd overall in the MAC Blue with a record of 3-2. The girls finished 3rd overall in the MAC Blue with a record of 2-3 overall. This year we saw two records broken. Jalen Smith broke his previous record of 1:55.47 in 800m with a time of 1:55.07, and also earned All State, All County, and All MAC honors. The 4x400 team of Zachary DiStefano, Kenneath Redd, Joshua Brady and Jalen Smith broke the record set in 1985, running a 3:24.30, and also received All County honors. Individually, Zachary DiStefano earned All County in 400m and All MAC in 200m. Joey Tavaleri earned All MAC and All County honors in 1600m. Additionally, we had three girls, Lila Rode (800m), Tamera Adderley (200m) and Courtney Nichol (100 Hurdles) earn All MAC honors. Lastly we had eight state qualifiers: Courtney Nichol (100 Hurdles), William Pranger (Pole Vault), Joey Tavalieri (1600, 4x800), Jalen Smith (800, 4x800, 4x400), Zachary DiStefano (4x400), Kenneth Redd II (4x400), Joshua Brady (4x400), Joe Kraus (4x800) and Derek Zbercot (4x800).

Boys Baseball

Thirteen seniors led the varsity team to a 21–14 record. The team won their 4th straight MAC Gold Championship with quality pitching and timely hitting. After falling just short the past several years, the team was able to win a District title. They defeated Lake Shore 6–0, Roseville 9–1 and Lakeview 2–1 to win their first District title since 2006. Vinnie Konvinski, Justin Sherman and Ryan Querro were each selected to the All League and All District teams.

Girls Tennis

The varsity tennis season came to a close with temperatures in the 80s and not a cloud in the sky. Unfortunately, it did not start that way. Weather hampered the beginning of the season dramatically — affecting matches and practices alike. The team finished with a record of 4-7-1 this season after losing 10 of 12 varsity players from last year. Despite finishing under .500, the girls improved greatly throughout the course of the season and were able to finish strong with a 4-1-1 record over the last six matches. Senior Captain Emily Solecki led the team with a record of 13-6 on the season. As impressive as they were on the court, their most incredible accomplishment may have been in the classroom; the team qualified for all-state academic honors with an astounding team GPA of 3.87 first semester.





Girls Soccer

The varsity girls soccer team had their first season under new head coach Paul Kepler (FHS Class of '04). They finished 5th in their division with a 2–6–2 MAC white record. Overall, they finished 8–10–3. The program won its first Division 1 District Championship in seven years by defeating Henry Ford II 2–0 in the championship game. The varsity girls also earned All MAC Academic team, with a team GPA of 3.5. They ended the year with two players making the All MAC Team, two players All County, seven players All District team, one player All Regional and one player All State. This season set a positive tone for the future of the varsity girls soccer program.

Girls Softball


The varsity softball team had a successful season finishing with a 17–15 overall record and 4th in the MAC Blue division. Sophomore Sydney Zombo led the team in hitting with a .524 batting average. Freshman Jaiden Lara set a new home run record with 13 and a new RBI record with 60. The team will lose three seniors — Bailey Duhaime, McKenzie Davey and Carly Landry — and return nine players next year.



Boys Golf

The Fraser boys golf team had a very successful season, despite graduating five seniors the year before and losing one of their best golfers to injury, who at the time had the lowest average on the team. Senior Noah Lowe was sidelined due to a lower body injury suffered early in the season. However, the team rallied around the "strictly business" mantra brought on by junior golfer Michael Paniccia. The team certainly lived by those words and put in lots of practice to overcome adversity and put up some of the best team numbers that Fraser has seen in years. The team struggled early on, but finished the season strong by winning their last three matches and taking first in the MAC Gold Division Tournament. They followed up that win by placing third only behind Farmington and Detroit Country Day at an Invitational just a week later. Finally, the team finished strong at Regionals with a team low 313. Ultimately the team fell short of qualifying for states, however, Senior Blake Shalawylo was able to qualify as an individual, firing 73 at regionals. The boys look to continue their success next season with the return of All Conference Sophomore Parker Bolda, and team leaders Michael Paniccia and Thomas "TJ" DeAngelo.
