


The May 2 bond proposal passed by a margin of more than 23 percentage points. The final vote was 61.7 percent, or 2,249 votes, in favor and 38.3 percent, or 1,394 votes, opposed.

The bonds will be sold in two series several years apart in order to save interest on the unused portion. The district is preparing to sell the first series, which will be for $\$ 30$ million of the approved $\$ 59$ million.

District leaders are working to identify the most critical projects and create a timeline for work to begin later this year. Projects include an additional layer of security at all schools and buildings in Fraser Public Schools, update building infrastructure, including roofs and exterior doors; update mechanical and electrical systems; update parking lots and sidewalks; improve site drainage, and replace equipment and buses that have reached the end of their useful life. Since some of our youngest learners were not exposed to as much interaction with peers and adults during their formative years, many skills that children often learn naturally during playtime, schools are seeing the need to specifically instruct throughout the school day.

The company will provide trainers who will help our teachers and principals examine our recess spaces, materials, and activities to create an environment of structured play that will enable our students to feel included and experience success at recess time.

Former NFL Quarterback and Be Nice Advocate Eric Hipple met with RMS and FHS students at the Fraser Grille to kick off the week in a positive way.

## A Writing Community Celebrates!

Eisenhower Elementary 4th-grade students shared the author's chair for a writing celebration of their published informational text writing. This writing is a processed piece that takes place over several weeks. Students conduct exploration of informational text features. They not only learn about the importance of informational text as readers but also as writers as they apply them to their own books.

The FHS Peer-to-Peer students and many FHS staff wore their autism acceptance shirts proudly to show support, not just for autism spectrum disorder, but for all differently abled people! They sold t-shirts with the money to fund field trips, supplies, celebrations, etc., for the Peer-to-Peer groups around the district.

As a bonus this year, David Klink, brother of Fraser graduate Steven Klink, created a ceiling tile in honor of his brother, who has autism, to be displayed in one of the social work offices. He shared the description below about his inspiration

The students publish their best work about a topic they already know a lot about. Then they share the author's chair, and each student reads a selection of their text to their classmates. Following their share out, the author selects what type of applause they would like. For example, snaps, toes, "round of applause," or a hearty "yee haw." Many students enjoy teaching about how to care for a family pet, teaching about a sport, dance, or craft, or even an animal that they are an expert about. Some other topics this year included "A Kid's Guide to Babe Ruth" and "Types of Instruments." These writings will become a part of the students' 4th-grade writing portfolio.

## Boys Baseball

The 2023 Varsity Baseball Team is currently 9-3 in the MAC Blue Division and 12-6 overall. Led by a deep pitching staff, including seniors Aidan Manzella, Bryson Roberts, and Cooper Koslowski, Fraser has successfully won season series against Port Huron, L'anse Creuse, and Port Huron Northern. Their offense is led by senior Nate Pearce, who is among the team leaders in batting average, OPS [on-base percentage and slugging percentage], RBIs [runs batted in], and runs scored. Key contributions have been made by sophomores Carson Bennie and Camden Townsend, whose defensive contributions and consistent bats have provided stability to the lineup. The Ramblers are currently in the running for a league title.


## Boys Golf

The Boys Varsity Golf Team is off to a promising start to their 2023 season. Thus far, they are 6-0 in MAC Division matches and placed 4th in the Husky Classic Golf Tournament at St. Clair Shores Golf Course on May 12. Ryan

At the MAC White Championship Meet, hosted at Fraser, the men took home a dramatic victory over rival Utica 135.33 to 134.33. The meet came down to the
last event ( $4 \times 400$ relay) and the team of William Minor, Michael Susan, Justin Roose, and Tyler Donovan took home the win to seal it. Their performance in the $4 \times 400$ is also now the County and Regional leading mark for the year. The women snagged third behind several earnest efforts, but none comparing to
the newly selected MAC White MVP, Grace Grupido. Grupido won the 1600 and 800, took second in the 400, and anchored the $4 \times 400$ relay to a second place as well.

Both genders are young teams and will remain at the top of the MAC/County for many years. One of the biggest additions was the new hurdle coach, Mike Hatch, who helped to develop eight AllConference performances in his first year at Fraser. As the team becomes deeper across the board, they are looking to become a force far beyond the local area.

The team has also seen dozens of new All-Time Top 10 marks posted thus far in 2023, but none bigger than the new 1600-meter school record run by Tyler Donovan at the Elaine Leigh High Performance Meet Hosted at Oakland University in late April. Tyler ran 4:20.77 to take down Steve Cullen's 2004 record of 4:20.97 from the State Finals that year.
