



Learn More About the **Bond Proposal**

The May 2 election is coming up in about two months and the district wants to make sure every voter is well-informed.

If approved, the \$59 million no-tax-rateincrease proposal will address projects at every school and district building.

Projects fall into four major categories:

Safety and security updates

An additional layer of security will be created at all school facilities and sites, including the installation of additional cameras, exterior door access controls, interior and exterior lighting, and sidewalk and parking lot updates.

Building updates

Facility updates will include replacing roofs, asphalt paving, concrete replacement, etc.

Updates will include improvements to mechanical and electrical systems at all school sites.

Technology updates

Updates will include the purchase of instructional and noninstructional computers and audio/visual systems at all school sites.

Equipment and bus replacement

Custodial equipment and buses that have reached the end of their useful life will be replaced.

To help everyone become more informed about the election, members of the district leadership team will be giving informational presentations on the following dates.

Bielawski Memorial Fund Established

A Fraser family recently made a generous donation to the instrumental music program in honor of Class of 1974 graduate John Bielawski.

The family of Mr. Bielawski, who passed away in 2019, donated \$35,000 in his memory to support the band program.

Mr. Bielawski participated in both the marching and symphony bands during his high school career, under legendary Fraser High School Band Director Seymour Okun.

"I would like for the donation to be used for something that might help to inspire and encourage a student of any age to continue in the music program," said Mr. Bielawski's father, Ralph Bielawski.

FHS Band Director, Jim Rodgers, worked with the family to determine the best use for the money. Together they decided to purchase several instruments that students can borrow and learn to play. These include two bass clarinets, two baritone saxophones,



two euphoniums, and three tenor drums. They will also purchase 14 drum carriers for use during the marching season.

"These instruments will be great additions to our band program at FHS," said Mr. Rodgers. "They will provide opportunities for students to play an instrument that they would not have otherwise been able to. Additionally, we will place a marker on the cases, letting students know they were purchased through the Bielawski Memorial Fund."

Finally, a plaque will hang in the performing arts area at FHS to honor Mr. Bielawski.
