



Edison Third Graders Visit Mackinac State Historic Parks...VIRTUALLY!



Edison 3rd-grade students in Mrs. Frazier's and Mrs. Parenteau's classes experienced a virtual field trip from the Mackinac State Historic Parks. Mackinac State Historic Parks is a family of living history museums and nature parks in northern Michigan's Straits of Mackinac and is an agency within the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. They offer various virtual presentations through the parks. During a live one-hour presentation, students learned about Michigan's Indigenous people and how they interacted with non-

Indigenous people who came here. They discovered where these non-Indigenous people came from and why Michigan was such a great place to settle. They looked at artifacts from primary and secondary sources like arrowheads, a cooking pot, and jewelry. They also looked at the different canoes they used for travel and how they made their homes.

ShyLee, a third grader, stated, "I got to learn about real things that happened long ago from the actual place it happened. It was cool!"

Ryli said, "I learned how they had different sizes of boats because if it was too big it might sink. It also helps them drive better on some of the Michigan lakes."

Mrs. Parenteau added, "It is nice to go visit some of these places we could never go to on a field trip. Virtual field trips are invaluable."

CURRICULUM CORNER

In Fraser Public Schools, we are committed to providing an early childhood learning opportunity that suits every family.

All our options feature small class sizes and are open to all Macomb County residents.

At the Dooley Center, Fraser offers half-day tuition preschool for both 3- and 4-year-old students that meets either two or three days a week.

We also offer the Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP) for 4-year-olds. Classes meet all day Monday-Thursday. GSRP is free to families that qualify, and on a sliding scale for everyone else.

For students entering elementary school, the district offers young fives and kindergarten. Young fives is designed for students who turn 5 between May 1 and December 1 and offers the same curriculum as kindergarten but at a slower pace. The program is currently offered in four elementary schools.

We have put together a short video that illustrates the early childhood options



and how they help students succeed throughout their school career.

Registration for young fives and kindergarten is currently open for the 2024-25 school year. Please visit

As you know, this year we are focusing on improving our attendance rates across all grade levels. Attendance rates have declined nationwide since the Covid pandemic, but we know it is important for our students to come to school every day. Typically, the number of absences increases after spring break and stays elevated through the end of the school year. We are trying to change that. When students return from spring break, those in grades 3-8 will prepare to take the MSTEP state assessments. Our middle and high school students will also prepare for the PSAT/SAT, which is an important assessment for college admissions.

Thank you to our families for helping our attendance rates improve over last year. I know we can continue to work together to keep the rates consistent through June. I also look forward to a successful Charity Week and community conversation.

District Celebrates Black History Month

Throughout the month of February, students in every grade learned about the impact of Black history.

Across the district our teachers have been intentional about celebrating diversity and honoring the contributions and sacrifices of African Americans who have helped to shape our nation.

Activities and learning are not limited to February. Instead they are taught throughout the school year as Black history is integral in American history.

Fraser High School

The Social Studies Department continues to pursue ways to incorporate diversity into teaching through video, speeches, presentations, and quest speakers. Famous Black Americans are studied, as well as landmark court cases and the civil rights movement. The timeline of struggle and success of all people is covered throughout the year. Recognizing that there was a need to cover more, the department also developed a one-semester class on civil rights.

Additionally, the achievements of minority groups and those who were monumental to their communities are spotlighted in a video series along with the daily announcements called "28 Days of Movement."

Richards Middle School

The February Honor the Castle theme is "Celebrating Diversity and Practicing Positivity." In

addition to the content covered in social studies classes throughout the month of February, information about African American history makers is included in the daily student emails.


Elementary Schools

At Edison Elementary, students in all grades have engaged in classroom discussions and activities around Black history. They've read inspiring stories about African American leaders who have overcome adversity to make a big impact on society, including Booker T. Washington, Martin Luther King, Jr., Ruth Simmons, George Washington Carver, Dr. Shirley Jackson, and Ruby Bridges.

In addition, students have discussed specific historical events that have transformed our lives. Some of these events include the desegregation of schools, the story of Rosa Parks and the Montgomery Bus Boycott, Jackie Robinson's debut in the MLB, and the March on Washington.

At Salk Elementary, 4th-grade students used a choice board to develop a project about a famous Black American. The flexibility in the project allowed students to do a project that was engaging while learning about the person they selected.

Emerson Elementary kindergarten students worked





with their 6th-grade reading buddies to create a Black History Heroes book titled "Be the Change." The book showcased instrumental Black history figures such Martin Luther King, Jr., Rosa Parks, Jackie Robinson, Aretha Franklin, and many more! On the last page, the students illustrated and colored a picture of themselves to show that they, too, can be part of the change.

Students at Mark Twain Elementary read several readaloud books and activities related to Black History Month. Fourth-grade students created pictures and writings based on "I Can Dream Like Dr. King."

Twain students also studied influential Black Americans in music, science, literature, the civil rights movement, and politics. They also discussed







how these important figures have influenced others like Elvis Presley and people today.

100th Day of School **CELEBRATIONS**

In February, elementary students celebrated 100 days of school!

They had learning activities focused on 100. Students stacked 100 cups, built with 100 Legos, counted snacks with 100 pieces, wrote about 100 days, learned about history 100 years ago, some dressed up like they were 100 years old, made igloos for a yeti with 100 jumbo marshmallows, put 100 colorful dots on a gumball machine with dot markers, and much more.

Everyone had so much fun reflecting on their learning and celebrating their first 100 days of school and is looking forward to many more days of learning ahead.











5th Grade Celebrates

1,000 Days of School

Fifth-grade classes at Disney Elementary celebrated the 1,000th day of school! The 1,000th day only applies to fifth-grade students on their 100th



day of fifth grade. This is how they got to 1,000 days: 180 days (KDG) + 180 days (1st grade) + 180 days (2nd grade) + 180 days (3rd grade) + 180 days (4th grade + 100 days (5th grade) = 1,000days of school! Some of the activities the students completed were writing a 1,000-word challenge, a writing prompt about what their lives will be like 1,000 days from now (when they are a junior in high school), and a math fraction puzzle that coded the words "Happy 1,000th Day." Lastly, the students received a special 1,000-day treat of cookies.

Eisenhower Elementary 5th-grade students celebrated 1,000 days of school by doing 1,000 math problems. All 5thgrade students received about 2 1/2 hours in total to do the 1,000 math problems. There was a variety of multiplication, division, adding, subtracting, and fraction problems. Students were excited and motivated to hear and complete the challenge. They could choose to work around the room and with a partner. When they finished, they got a sticker that said, "1,000 math problem genius."

It was a fun and exciting day in 5th grade!



Be NICE Club Wins \$10,000 to **Shut Out Bullying**

The Fraser High School and Richards Middle School Be NICE club recently won \$10,000 from the Detroit Red Wings and Planet Fitness to help "Shut Out Bullying."

Eighteen students, club advisors, and staff received a check before the February 10 Red Wings game, and were recognized on the jumbotron during the game.

The student-led club started during the 2022-23 school year after four student leaders had a desire to "create a positive culture in their school that addressed the dynamic student needs in response to student mental health and bullying within our school," said FHS Counselor and Be NICE advisor Ms. Stacy Kalpin.

Be NICE is an evidence-based program that encourages individuals to challenge themselves and others to seek appropriate professional help when they notice changes in their mental health. NICE is an acronym for a four-step action plan:

- Notice what is right or different about others
- Invite yourself to reach out if you notice others are struggling



- Challenge stigma about mental health and challenge that person to get help from an adult
- Empower yourself and others with knowledge and resources about mental health

The purpose of the club is to work on a systems level to spread positive change that impacts EVERY student in our buildings with a focus on increasing education, awareness, and resources related to mental health.

The donation will impact all 2,200 students at RMS and FHS. Ms. Kalpin said they plan to use the money for student leadership conferences, including identifying non-traditional student leaders and providing opportunities for them to build skills and confidence; a community wellness night for all Fraser students and their families; bringing in a speaker and providing daily activities during Mental Health Week; mental health first aid training; positive behavior recognition of staff and students who stand up to bullying and are positive role models; and general funds to support the club's stability and needed supplies.

families to keep our students in Tier 1 for attendance (missing 10% or less of the school year). Each day of school is an

opportunity for students to learn as well as connect to peers and their teachers. When students return from spring break on April 2, many of them will prepare to take a state or national assessment.

Students in grades 3-8 will take the MSTEP in April and May; grades 8-10 will take the PSAT in April and grade 11 will take the SAT. These assessments provide benchmark data to the district, as well as help in college admissions.

As long as your student is healthy, please encourage showing up to class when school is in session.

Eisenhower SOARS



Eisenhower's talented and responsible Broadcast Members teamed up with the Student Council Officers to review their SOAR expectations. Students worked diligently, utilizing their own recess times, to create a video that entertained their audience, while effectively reminding them of the school expectations.

For "S" in SOAR, students reviewed safety procedures in all areas of the school. including lines in the hallway to the cafeteria and playground. For the "O" students reviewed the expectations and importance of taking ownership of actions both in the classroom and at recess times. To review the "A" students explained how vital it is to accept responsibility and be tolerant and inclusive of others. Finally, to review the "R" students demonstrated how to use respect through daily interactions in our school. This powerful presentation will inspire all IKE students to SOAR!



Third-Grade **Michigan Program**



Eisenhower third-grade students are preparing for the annual Michigan program. The Michigan program has been a tradition for over 35 years at Eisenhower. Continuing this tradition has strengthened student understanding of Michigan and creates a fun and memorable way of learning. This program is very important as it encompasses all the things we learn about our great state. Students will show what they learned about Michigan through music, poetry, and dance. They are reading poetry about the Great Lakes, singing songs about the Anishinabek, Voyagers, Great Lakes, Mackinac Bridge, and dancing to the Michigan Waltz. The students are excited to perform for their families and school in June.

Twain Students Learn About the Past

Recently, third-grade students at Mark Twain had the opportunity to hear from presenter Genot Picor.

Genot comes from a line of French Voyageurs and Native Americans. During his presentation, students learned about what life was like in Michigan in the 1700s. The students had the opportunity to see and touch animal furs and foot imprints, as well as tools from that time period. Students were also able to participate in traditional Native American stories, songs, dances, and games. This learning opportunity greatly enhanced the students' experience of our third-grade Michigan social studies curriculum. Here is what the kids thought:

Salk **Positive Behavior** Program



This year, Salk Elementary relaunched its Positive Behavior program with great success. Students have been excited and taken ownership in

"Respecting the Nest" by presenting at monthly town hall meetings. These presentations, created by the students, share the student's perspective on what positive behavior and monthly character traits look like in action. This past month, Salk has added a new component to the program. Along with recognizing individuals for displaying positive behaviors with "hawk cash," they are now recognizing whole classrooms when they are demonstrating those outstanding behaviors. In addition, Salk has turned these classroom recognitions into a

monthly contest. Grades young-five through third compete to earn a mini stuffed "Sammy Seahawk," while grades four through six compete to win a "Golden Egg" trophy. They announce the winners at their monthly town hall meetings. Congratulations to Mrs. Edmund's class on winning control of the Golden Egg trophy for the first month, and congratulations to Mrs. Gutc's, Mrs. Galagher's, and Mrs. Sutter's classes, who all won a share of the stuffed Sammy Seahawk for our first month!



Learning About Communities

Students identified what responsibilities they have for themselves, their family, their school, and their city. They completed over 20 close and critical readings that taught them about the jobs that help the community.


Finally, each student chose a job they would like to have. They wrote about what they needed to be successful in that position and why they chose it. They also drew their uniforms with a picture of their face!



Sports Medicine Certification

Sports Medicine students at Fraser High School have been busy gaining knowledge and certification in a variety of areas including CPR/First Aid, Stop the Bleed, and Concussion Recognition. During first semester they received industry-recognized certification for American Red Cross Adult and Pediatric First Aid/CPR/ AED. In turn, they led skills stations for the PE classes.

At the start of second semester, Stop the Bleed certification was next. where students learned to recognize life-threatening bleeding as well as wound packing and tourniquet application. Both these certifications



were led by instructor Marti Van-I. Most recently, students completed the National Federation of High Schools Concussion in Sports course. All these certifications will give our Sports Med students an advantage when applying for summer jobs and/ or youth coaching positions.

Building Vocabularies in the 5th Grade



Fifth-grade students at Eisenhower work on expanding their vocabularies in English Language Arts. At the start of each week, students receive a list of words found in their novel study, which is currently "The Sign of the Beaver." They use their online dictionary skills to identify each word's part of speech, create images or symbols, write friendly definitions, and apply the new words to real life with examples and non-examples of the words. These entries are added to a personal word collection book. Students are encouraged to add new words they encounter when reading independently at school and at home. Additionally, students work to commit these words to their lexicons through games, such as, Hedbanz, Pictionary, and Blooket.
