

## Make Sure Your VOTEACOUNTS <br> 

Election Day is next week, and there are a variety of ways to make sure your vote counts.

Remember, there will be no change in the current tax rate if voters approve the Fraser Public Schools bond proposal. Conversely, there will not be an immediate decrease of the current tax rate if voters do not approve the proposal. Homeowners in our district will be assessed the same 7 mils ( $\$ 7$ per $\$ 1,000$ of assessed value on their homes] regardless of the outcome of the election.

## Absentee Ballots

If you previously requested an absentee ballot, but have not returned it, you only have a few days to make sure your vote is counted. Take your completed ballot to your city's Clerk's Office.

You can put your ballot in the drop box or take it inside. You must deliver your ballot no later than 8 p.m. on Election Day, May 2.

You can also request an absentee ballot in person at your Clerk's Office now through Election Day during normal business hours.

## Saturday Voting

The Clerk's Offices also have special hours this weekend to help voters apply for and cast an absentee ballot.

- Clinton Township will be open 8:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m.
- City of Fraser will be open 8:00 a.m. - 4:30 p.m.
- City of Roseville will be open 8:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m.


## Election Day

Polls will be open 7:00 a.m. - 8:00 p.m. As a reminder, all Clinton Township voters must vote at Salk Elementary for this election.

## CURRICULUM CORNER

As another great school year is winding down, families are beginning to plan their days and weeks of summer. While planning each day without a school schedule, families can continue to support their children's learning while still having time for their summer activities.

Here are a few suggestions to reinforce and continue learning during the summer months:

- Read! Read! Read! - Help your child set reading goals for the summer and provide reading opportunities by visiting a library, reading to each other, or exploring websites with ageappropriate text. Consider setting aside a dedicated time of the day for reading, such as morning or just before bed.


## Fraser Introduces

 Interactive Read-Aloud KitsThe district is reaffirming its commitment to literacy with new interactive read-aloud (IRA) kits in every elementary classroom.

At the April 19 professional development, teachers were given time to explore the kits and set them up in their classrooms. According to the Fountas and Pinnell website, IRA is a whole-group instructional context in which the teacher reads aloud a selected text to the whole class, occasionally and selectively pausing for conversation. Students think about, talk about, and respond to the text as a whole group or in small groups. Both the reader and listeners actively process the language, ideas, and meaning of the text. Each set contains grade-level books and teacher materials that focus on topics such

- Seek Out Math Opportunities - Look for opportunities to support math skills while shopping, playing, or watching sports, or practicing math concepts such as multiplication tables.
- Provide Play Time - Physical activity has positive effects on academic achievement, concentration, and behavior.
- Encourage Good Deeds - Help your child find ways to engage in activities that help others to aid in their socialemotional development. Helping family members or neighbors, or performing any community services will provide a learning experience and support overall well-being.

as kindness, friendship, and science. They also align with other subject areas and can reinforce learning across subjects.
Teachers will introduce one IRA text before the end of the year and kick off a full rollout in the fall.
"The district is always looking for ways to meet the needs of all students," said Dr. Sara Delgado, director of elementary instruction. "Between our data and feedback from teachers, we knew that additional literacy support was a priority to focus on."
The purchase of the kits was approved by the board of education in March and uses grant funds from the state's Learning Loss grant and the federal Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief [ESSER] grant.

Soon, Dooley students will observe them hatch and turn into fluffy yellow chicks. With an incubator set up in the library, the students are brought by daily to learn how much the chicks have grown and how much longer it will be until they will meet their new friends. With the weather warming up and all the animals making their appearances, spring is a great time to learn all about these life cycles!

# Seahawks Powered Up with Reading 

> Salk Elementary Seahawks powered up with reading for a Mario Kart-themed March is Reading Month.

The school was divided into three mixed-grade-level teams - Team Mario, Team Luigi, and Team Toad - and they competed to read the most minutes and claim the Seahawk Cup.

Team Mario was victorious, reading a total of 125,725 minutes. Each classroom on the winning team will have a popcorn and movie party in the Media Center. Team Toad finished in second place with 115,927 minutes read, and Team Luigi added another 99,628 minutes to the school's total. This means the Seahawks read a total of 341,180 minutes in March! As a surprise incentive, Mr. Dave, Salk's custodian, agreed to shave his head if our Seahawks read more than 300,000

minutes. Our Seahawks accepted the challenge and easily surpassed the goal! Mr. Dave debuted his new hairdo at Salk on Friday, April 14.

The students were given calendars with daily suggestions to make reading fun. They were also encouraged to write "Power Up" reviews of books they enjoyed and were invited to read their reviews during the daily announcements.

Salk celebrated reading throughout the month with spirits days for Dr. Seuss and Mario Kart, and weekly team color days. Each week, two book prize winners from each class were selected from the reading logs turned in and were given prizes. Any Seahawk who turned in four weeks of reading logs on time earned a ticket to a USPBL Baseball Game at Jimmy John's Field in Utica.

## Cause and Effect in the 6th Grade

Sixth-grade students at Eisenhower Elementary began the third trimester by writing a cause-and-effect essay on invasive species. They started the unit with a lesson on text structure. After watching a short video called "For the Birds," they summarized the plot focusing on using cause-and-effect signal words.

This introductory activity prepared students to organize and draft an essay on the causes and effects of invasive species. Students researched and chose different invasive species, and discovered how they get into new ecosystems and the harm that they cause once there.


Next, they will be studying text features in informational text and adding them to their drafts. After publishing their essays, students will share their work with peers and celebrate their accomplishments as writers.

## Sixth-Grade Students Explore Career Pathways



The 6th-grade students in the district continue to explore career pathways in partnership with the district's Career Navigators and Career Technical Education department.

During April, students completed a program to get more comfortable with Xello.

First, Career Navigators traveled to each elementary school and helped them complete a student profile
in Xello. This software encourages self-discovery among students, creates career awareness, and builds future readiness skills.
"We're trying to get you to think 'what do I want to do
with my life when I get out of here?' It seems like a long time, but it'll be over before you know it," Career Navigator Mr. Robert Boyd told students at Twain Elementary. "Then you have a choice: you're either going to go to college or go to work. We'd like you to start thinking about this right now: 'What do I like to do? What am I good at?'"

The following week, students created business cards. They were encouraged to add pictures based on their likes and interests. The final part of the program was a lunch at Richards Middle School during the last week of April.

This event builds upon a career fair hosted by CTE students from Fraser High School back in February and is part of a district-wide initiative to bring career awareness to the elementary schools.

## HUNKS and CHUNKS

In second grade at Disney Elementary, teachers and staff work to support their young readers with many resources to build students' literacy skills. One of those resources is a phonics sound wall that they call "Hunks and Chunks."

Each day, they sing a song and do motions that help the students to solidify the many parts of language that may be challenging for young readers to master in their reading and writing. This wall is posted in each

second-grade classroom and is also included in each student's writing folder. It serves as a resource for their writing and reading time at school. It is also posted on their classroom CANVAS page, along with a demonstration video with the song and motions for learning at home. Having a bodily kinesthetic connection to our learning has proven to be a wonderful addition to the literacy program at Disney.

## Fractions are Delicious!



Mrs. Ruhl's and Mrs. Schmidt's 5th-grade classes at Edison Elementary learned how to multiply fractions in a fun and delicious way. Students worked in teams to determine what the measurements of each ingredient would be to cut a Muddy Buddies recipe to one-sixth. Once they solved it, they measured the ingredients, and made the recipe. Then they enjoyed their tasty creation!

The 5th graders really enjoyed this hands-on activity. Medina said, "It was a mix of math and science." Savannah was so excited, she said, "This was bussin!" This real-world experience enforced how fractions are everywhere, even in an everyday snack.

## Expressive Art at RMS

Detour Project is a youth-driven expressive art program meant to give teens a set of skills and tools to help them improve their overall emotional well-being. An 8th-grade group was started at Richards Middle School this past February. This program is offered through KnowResolve, a non-profit organization that has been working to promote mental health.

Expressive art is exactly what it sounds like. It's about expressing your emotions through creativity, and by doing so, you can access emotions in a way not possible with words alone.

The activities support teens by reducing stress and increasing problem-solving skills, decisionmaking skills, and positive emotions.
The RMS Detour Project group meets every other week, and starts with a quick icebreaker. The group moves on to their activity and ends with a quote

that ties to their activity. Students create their projects while sitting in a circle. The circle symbolizes connection, unity, wholeness, and the circle of life.
The students have expressed a positive attitude about the group, and they feel like they are going back to their roots of being in kindergarten with their art projects. They have realized that you don't have to be an artist to be a part of this group, and they don't mind sharing because they know they are safe amongst the group and circle they have created.
