Michigan Art Educator OF THE YEAR



Congratulations to Fraser High School art teacher Roger Drabant, who has been recognized as the Michigan Art Education Association High School Division Art Teacher of the Year and the Michigan Art Educator of the Year!

Each year, the Michigan Art Education Association [MAEA] recognizes art teachers from the Elementary, Middle, and High School divisions, as well as an overall Art Educator of the Year.

To be considered for the award, a teacher must be a member of the MAEA and be nominated by a fellow member. There are over 700 art teachers in Michigan who are members of the organization. The vetting process is extensive and based on

work through the state organization co-chair. Mr. Drabant is the Region 6 co-liaison, the K-12 Show chair, and the Ethnicity, Diversity, and Inclusion (ED&I) co-chair. He has presented at every state conference for the past 10 years and has served on several conference committees, including co-chairing the 2019 conference in Port Huron.

The committee also looks at involvement at the national level through the National Art Education Association, regional and national awards earned by students, letters of support, and personal shows as a displaying/practicing artist.

This year, there were a dozen nominations from the High School Division. "I am honored that I was selected to represent the Michigan Art Education Association as this year's High School Division Art Teacher of the Year, considering those who were also nominated," said Mr. Drabant.

Once the three division-level Teachers of the Years are selected, the committee brings in past State Art Educators of the Year awardees to vet the three finalists and help select the one teacher who will represent the state organization at the national-level conference as the MAEA Art Educator of the Year. This year's conference will take place in San Antonio, Texas in April. Mr. Drabant has also been selected as the Michigan Art Educator of the year!

"This is a huge honor and privilege, and I look forward to accepting the award at the annual fall conference in November. To be considered for any state-level award is an honor; to be selected for both the High School Division Art Teacher of the Year and the Michigan Art Educator of the Year is humbling, to say the least," said Mr. Drabant.

CURRICULUM CORNER

Fraser Public Schools' staff kicked off this school year with two great days of professional learning.

On August 24, all staff members gathered for a welcome breakfast and opening presentation from Dr. Wozniak. Her presentation included highlighting our Fraser High School teacher cadets. Three of our student leaders spoke about their experience working with elementary students in our summer school program. It was an inspiration hearing their reflection on the experience, as well as a testament to Fraser staff members who guided our students through the process. On August 25, all teachers from grades PreK-12 gathered again at Fraser High School to learn from each other. Topics included our new Learning Management System (Canvas), trauma-informed instruction, small-group instruction, social-emotional learning, student grading practices, and much more. Research studies show that some of the most impactful learning teachers can experience is when they are learning from each other. Teachers appreciate and value the knowledge of their colleagues who are in the classroom every day working with students. In Fraser, we are lucky to have staff members who are filled with expertise on a variety of topics. Our initial professional learning sessions this year were a success due to the dedication of our staff members to being lead learners for our district.

As the year continues, we will remain focused on providing professional learning opportunities for our teachers and staff members that will help them grow as practitioners and professionals. Leaning on the expertise of our own staff members is an effective and rewarding way to grow together as a collective group in Fraser Public Schools.

The parent component of our new learning management system, Canvas, launches in October.

A Supportive Learning Environment



Disney Elementary started the year focusing on establishing positive relationships, building community, developing routines, and learning how to be prepared to learn. Their staff wants students to feel welcome, safe, and have a positive sense of community.

"I will speak from my heart with respect for myself and others." This is the opening statement that our second graders are saying at Disney every day before they begin a restorative circle. Both classes are learning what it means to be a positive part of a community in class and school.

As part of their SEL practices, students use a talking piece for each circle and share things – from what their favorite foods are to what feelings they have about experiences in their lives. Students and staff are working to build a strong connection in each class where every student feels safe and validated, knowing that every voice matters.

At the end of each circle, students close with this statement, "I am grateful for myself and my class." Disney looks forward to seeing each student grow as a person and as a member of their class family. The goal is that teachers and students all feel supported in their learning environment.

Second grade at Eisenhower Elementary was busy the first two weeks of school learning procedures and expectations and building classroom communities.




Students participated in an M&M candy "Getting to Know You" activity, made things with Play-Doh to describe themselves, and shared

Cyber Security and Computer Programming **RECEIVE GRANTS**

The Cyber Security and Computer Programming programs at Fraser High School are the recipients of two national grants that will directly impact students and enhance learning.


The Cyber Security program was awarded a technology grant from Cyber.org worth about \$7,000. The grant provides 100 licenses to US Cyber Range, a virtual training space that simulates a variety of security incidents. This provides students with a safe environment for realistic, hands-on cybersecurity labs and exercises.

"This is something new at Fraser High School, and we will be implementing it in the upcoming months in my Cybersecurity and Advanced Cybersecurity courses," said program director Mrs. Christina Vrzovski.

Mrs. Vrzovski applied for the grant during the summer and found out in August that FHS had been selected.

"What an honor, especially in a field like cybersecurity where there is zero percent unemployment," she said. "These are the jobs of the future and Fraser is enhancing its cybersecurity programs by providing new and innovative tools to prepare our students for success."

FHS is also one of the newest partners of the Amazon Future Engineer program through Project STEM, which will enhance the Computer Programming classes at FHS. Mrs. Vrzovski applied a year ago, and recently found out she was selected for the national program.



"I am humbled to be able to provide such an amazing program for our students from such a highly recognized organization like Amazon. This makes me happy to know that our students are receiving incredible opportunities in a world where cybersecurity and computer programming play an important role in society. My students are eager to get started with both Project STEM and US Cyber Range."

The Amazon-funded resources and support provides preparatory lessons, tutorials, and professional development for teachers and fully sequenced digital curriculum for students. These courses are designed to inspire, prepare, and propel students in their pursuit of computer science education. Mrs. Vrzovski plans to incorporate them into her existing computer science class.

"These curriculums align with the computer science standards, and the learning environment makes it easy for the students to navigate," she said. "Amazon Future Engineer's mission is to increase access to computer science education and prepare students (at any age) for careers in computer science. This opportunity will help students realize their potential as thinkers and builders."
