Four House System

To start the year, RMS has added an additional layer to its PBIS system to foster a positive and inclusive school culture with the implementation of the Ron Clark House System.

This program is designed to promote teamwork, leadership, and a sense of belonging among our Castle Crew Community. To close out this year's First Four activities (first week of school), seminar classes were sorted into one of four houses during a whole-school assembly: ALTRUISMO, REVEUR, AMISTAD, or ISIBINDI. Throughout the year, staff can award points to students or houses based on participation in activities, displaying PBIS values and monthly character traits, as well as promoting collaboration with peers across grade levels.

Here is a brief overview of each house:

- ALTRUISMO (House of Givers) Black: This house values generosity and encourages students to uplift others through acts of kindness and service.
- AMISTAD (House of Friendship) Red: Students in this house are encouraged to demonstrate empathy, care, and support for others.
- ISIBINDI (House of Courage) Green: Inspiring, courageous, and committed. Students in this house encourage others to stay steadfast and true.
- **REVEUR** [House of Dreamers] Blue: This house is competitive, passionate, and goal oriented. These students have big goals and are determined.



The House System provides a unique opportunity for students to develop a strong sense of community and belonging. It promotes school spirit and friendly competition, helping students build connections throughout the building with house meetings and celebrations. The system encourages teamwork, leadership skills, and the development of core values like respecting others, modeling responsibility, and making safe choices. Additionally, it empowers students to take ownership of their school environment and fosters a culture of positive reinforcement.

We look forward to the positive impact this system will have at RMS, as these four houses become one Castle family.

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CURRICULUM CORNER LEARLY LEDUCATION

Enrollment in our Young Fives and Great Start Readiness preschool programs continues to grow.

This upward trend reaffirms the district's commitment to providing valuable learning opportunities for our youngest students.

Young Fives is now offered at five elementary schools, with plans to add a class at the final elementary school in the future. This year, the Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP) expanded to five sections at the Dooley Center.

The data reveals a 12.5% growth in GSRP and a 25% increase in Young Fives enrollment this year, marking a pivotal moment for our district's early education efforts.

Young Fives provides a vital bridge between preschool and kindergarten.

This program focuses on developing foundational skills in a nurturing environment, ensuring that children are prepared for the transition to kindergarten the following year.

"Young Fives was moved out of the Dooley Center and into our elementary schools three years ago," said Kate Mulligan, director of elementary instruction. "Since making that move, we have seen an increase in enrollment every year – growing from three classrooms the first year to five classrooms this year. We screen all incoming students at the time of enrollment to help families determine the best path for their child. That screening, combined with the convenience of the program located within our elementary schools, is driving the enrollment increase."

The GSRP preschool program offers free, high-quality education to four-yearolds from families who meet certain income requirements. This program is instrumental in closing the achievement gap by providing children with essential skills and a strong start before they enter Young Fives or kindergarten.

The increase in enrollment in both programs signifies a broader trend toward valuing early childhood education. Fraser Public Schools is committed to meeting the diverse needs of our students and families by providing tailored educational experiences that set the stage for long-term success.

Edison Kids Are **Bucket Fillers**

Fifth graders at Edison Elementary are Bucket Fillers! After reading the book "Have You Filled a Bucket Today?" by Carol McCloud, students went home and filled someone's bucket. Students learned that there are so many ways to fill a person's bucket. Small actions can be just as important as large ones! Londyn filled her mom's bucket by helping her with laundry, making dinner, and doing the dishes. Jase made sure that he told his grandma goodnight before he went to bed.

Buzzing into a New Year with PBIS!

As the school year kicks off, our littlest learners at the Dooley Center are buzzing with excitement!

This year, they kicked things off with a Positive Behavioral Intervention and Supports (PBIS) assembly, bringing together the Dooley Bees in their hive.

The friendly Dooley Bee, Bumbles, made a special appearance to teach the



students about the schoolwide behavior reward system. During the assembly, Bumbles introduced the three B's: **Bee Safe, Bee in Control**, and **Bee Responsible**. When the students exemplify these behaviors, they earn a bee from a staff member. These bees go into their class jar, and once the entire school fills up their hive, they celebrate with exciting rewards like hallway dance parties and popcorn parties!

In addition to the rewards, they also learned the school-wide callback to get students' attention. The callback is "Bees, are you ready?" When they hear this, students respond by showing the American Sign Language sign for the letter "B," signaling that they are ready to listen and learn.

Bumbles emphasized the importance of making good choices and how each student plays a vital role in creating a safe and supportive family environment at our school. After the assembly, Bumbles continued the fun by visiting classrooms and personally awarding bees to students who made her feel safe and welcome.

Everyone is thrilled to see the Dooley Bees embracing these positive behaviors as they work together to make this school year a fantastic one. Let's keep buzzing with enthusiasm and support one another as we soar to new heights!

The students are learning that people are not just born smart; they must work hard to learn. Some great stories that involve





characters using a growth mindset are "The Most Magnificent Thing" and "The Girl Who Never Made Mistakes." The classes went through examples of thoughts they can tell themselves to stay in that growth mindset. Our second graders are definitely ready to take on the next challenge!

Classroom **Community**

Second-grade students at Edison spent the first few weeks of school building their classroom communities. They have done many activities to help them get to know each other. Activities such as sharing "All About Me Bags," using M&Ms to answer questions about themselves, and working together to assemble puzzles.

A strong sense of community is important to a student's success. Students who feel connected



to their community are more likely to be engaged in learning, participate and thrive in the learning environment, develop social and emotional competencies, and act ethically and altruistically.

Charlie the Dog is Back!



Charlie, the English Creme Golden Retriever, started visiting Salk once a week in 2023. Charlie is a certified therapy dog and part of the Salk Family. Charlie has returned this year, and the students could not wait to see him. Studies have shown that therapy dogs have the ability to increase positive emotions, promote engagement in learning activities and positive attitudes toward learning, and reduce negative behaviors, as well as encouraging prosocial behaviors including acting as a social catalyst to facilitate social interactions with others. Charlie's purpose is to ease students' anxieties and increase positive emotions. Results from student surveys have shown that Charlie has done that.

Charlie is a certified therapy dog after completing his training and testing by the Alliance of Therapy Dogs. He has also earned the title of AKC Canine Good Citizen.



McMahon Thrift Store Opens at FHS

After months of planning, the McMahon Thrift Store, located inside Fraser High School, opened in late September.

About 70 students visited the store on the first day, which is open before and after school Tuesday through Friday.

The store is named in honor of Mr. Connor McMahon, a social studies teacher who unexpectedly passed away in June 2023. It is also located in his former classroom.



Social Studies Department Head Mr. James Socha said Mr. McMahon championed the phrase "It's for the kids!" and that's the goal of the store.

"Our district has many students in need and students who like to thrift. Melding those two ideas together will help take away some of the stigma," Mr. Socha said.

All items in the store are free, and students can take up to three items each day. The store offers clothing and accessories, such as ties, belts, and bags/purses. There is also a special request box for students who have a need that isn't met in the store.

Currently, students are helping to keep the store stocked and items folded. Mr. Socha said in the future he would love to partner with student organizations at FHS to help with staffing and earning service hours.
