SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE



Dear Fraser Families.

As we approach the end of the school year, it is a time to look back on all that we have accomplished this year as well as look

forward to summer projects and the 2024-2025 school year.

This year, the district began working on projects from the 2023 bond. This includes replacing window blinds throughout the district, updating sound systems in elementary classrooms, and replacing staff MacBooks.

When it comes to physical safety, we created and implemented emergency bags for every classroom in the district. Each bag contains an emergency procedures flip chart, first aid kit, and class roster. In the event of an emergency or need to evacuate the classroom, teachers will take these bags with them. We also upgraded our two-way radios, so the entire district is on the same system.

Our board of education voted to eliminate the pay-to-play fees for Richards Middle School and Fraser High School athletics, saving families money and playing sports more accessible to all students.

We also revamped the PBIS programs across the district, implementing them for the first time at the Dooley Center and FHS. These programs proactively teach students behavior expectations in different settings.

CURRICULUM CORNER

UNIVERSAL DESIGN

In Fraser Public Schools, staff are being trained on the practices of Universal Design for Learning (UDL).

UDL is a teaching framework that helps optimize student engagement by acknowledging and accounting for hurdles in the learning process. The tenants of UDL ask a teacher to consider three key pillars:

Engagement – In this pillar, focus is put on how to best recruit student interest on the topic of the day, methods for sustaining effort and persistence in student work, and strategies for self-regulation.

Representation – It is important to consider the way information

is presented to students. In this pillar, staff are asked to reflect on utilizing multiple methods to share information, language, and symbols (i.e. written, auditory, graphic design, etc.) and use those methods to enhance comprehension techniques.

Action and Expression – The final pillar is focused on developing strategies for students to interact with the material. Consideration is given to how students physically work with materials, express and communicate learning, and utilize

their executive functioning skills to properly manage workload.

Next school year, Fraser Public Schools is designing professional development to continue this work K-12. We believe that UDL is a framework that can guide lesson design in a way to meet the needs of our diverse learners. It is a framework that asks us to leverage the experience of our teachers, the technology provided to our students, and consider the barriers to learning that could occur and prevent students from engaging further.

Michigan Heart Safe School

Richards Middle School is now recognized as a Michigan Heart Safe School. On Thursday, May 9, select RMS staff who represent the first responder team participated in an emergency drill to show their skills, knowledge, and application of responding to a medical emergency. Earlier this year, staff underwent training to renew and review their certification for CPR, First Aid, and use of an AED device. Staff engaged in the drill as if it were a real emergency, and



all participants experienced roles in real time. In the end, RMS joined Fraser High School with this recognition.

The WIN routine begins with practice sessions, ensuring all students understand the process and expectations. During WIN time, students encounter a choice board offering "Must Do" activities followed by additional options. One non-negotiable "Must Do" is reading books suited to their individual skill and reading levels. Students can opt to read independently or collaborate with peers.

Literacy choices are tailored to the class's evolving needs and are established at the onset of the academic year. These options span a range of activities, including word puzzles, word/picture sorting, exploring poetry, sentence building, and engaging in independent writing tasks. Such varied activities accommodate diverse learning styles and preferences, ensuring every student can access and excel in their learning journey.

Arbor DayTree Planting

Bielawski Memorial Honored

Disney 6th-grade students used cereal boxes to learn about surface area and volume. These cereal boxes were used as visuals on how a three-dimensional rectangular prism can be transformed into a two-dimensional net. After reading about the history of cereal, observing details of various cereal boxes, they began creatively designing their own cereal covers that included their measurements



and calculations. This activity tied into their end of module five unit, providing a realworld example to enhance spatial reasoning and geometric understanding.

Twain Third-Grade Students Visit Greenfield Village



Recently, third-grade students at Mark Twain elementary school spent the day at Greenfield Village. Greenfield Village is an open-air museum founded by Henry Ford. It is home to many historical artifacts and homes of famous Americans. Students explored a working farm, glassblowing, pottery making, a textile factory, and more. They experienced horse-drawn carriages, Model T cars, and a working

train. Students especially enjoyed seeing and learning about Thomas Edison's Menlo Park Laboratory.

Space Glow Day

Recently, Eisenhower's secondgrade classrooms participated in a space glow day room transformation. They rotated through several ELA and math stations. They learned about the planets, did a planet scavenger hunt, measured planets, did a verb activity,



and created a spacecraft. They used highlighters to complete their work and got glow sticks and hats to take home.



History Day

Michigan History Day, an educational program of the Historical Society of Michigan, is a yearlong educational program that encourages students to explore local, state, national, and world history. After selecting a historical topic that relates to the annual theme. students conduct extensive research by using libraries, archives, museums, and oral history interviews. They analyze and interpret their findings, draw conclusions about their topics' significance in history, and create final projects in one of five categories: documentary, exhibit, paper, performance, or website. The experience culminates in a series of contests at the local level, which progress to our state competition. Winning competitors are eligible to move on to the National History Day competition held in Washington, D.C., each June!

Four Educators Complete Galileo Academy

Three teachers and an elementary principal are the latest group of Fraser educators to complete the Galileo consortium two-year academy.



Eisenhower Elementary Young Fives teacher Amy Laidlaw, MTSS/UDL coach Renee Biegas, Disney Elementary 6th-grade teacher Stephanie McGuffey, and Eisenhower Elementary principal Jen Kelley completed the program in May.

According to the Galileo website, the Academy is

a two-year seminar series designed to develop teacher leaders. It is the first level of engagement in the Galileo consortium, which works with districts throughout Macomb, Oakland, and Wayne counties.

The curriculum addresses educational and leadership issues and themes. Instructional strategies are based on principles of collaboration, inquiry, problem-solving, reflection, informational systems, and technology. Teacher leaders learn from national experts, videos, case studies, dialogues, field investigations, team building, study groups, readings, reflective journaling, and action research.

This capacity-building curriculum focuses on developing communities of learners and leaders who collaborate to renew organizations and ensure learning for all. Academy participants assess their own learning and make contributions to their organizations and the education profession.

This fall, four new Fraser educators will begin the program. They are elementary behavior consultant Melissa Kiger; Emerson Elementary 6th-grade teacher Ryan McCoy; Emerson Elementary 5th-grade teacher Shawn Pashby; and Fraser High School science teacher Kate Pionk.

Michigan Green Schools

Michigan Green Schools certifies schools annually for various levels of stewardship by earning points for activities in the four categories of Reduce/Reuse/Recycle, Energy, Environmental Protection, and Miscellaneous Environmental Activities.

To receive a Michigan Green School certification, a school must document completion of at least 10 approved environmental activities. Schools can achieve one of three status levels, depending on the number of activities documented:

- Michigan Green School Status: 10-14 activities
- Michigan Emerald School: 15-19 activities
- Michigan Evergreen School: 20 or more activities

Several schools in our district were awarded Green Schools designations:

RMS received the Evergreen designation, which is the highest in the several years for them. They also were the recipients of a \$100 grant to Ray Wiegands Nursery for their atrium in the selective hall.


Sports Wrap-Ups


Varsity Softball


Boys Golf


