ALL FAMILIES ENCOURAGED TO COMPLETE FREE, **REDUCED MEALS APPLICATION**

All students are again eligible for free breakfast and lunch during the school day. However, families are still encouraged to complete the free and reduced-price meals application before October 15.

The district receives funding that supports a variety of programs based on the number of families who qualify for free or reduced-price meals. Additionally, families who complete the application may be eligible for programs and services from other organizations.

The application takes only a few minutes to complete, and can be found here.

We encourage everyone to participate in free meals this school year. Menus can be found on our website.

Many families have expressed concern about it taking away from children that are truly in need, but there is enough funding to cover all meals, and we will have enough food available. Families are still welcome to send in a lunch from home if they would prefer.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS About the Non-Homestead Election

When is the election?

November 2, 2021.

What does non-homestead mean?

Non-homestead represents industrial, commercial, second homes and some agricultural property. It does not include a family's primary residence.

Is this a new tax?

No. The non-homestead millage was last approved by voters in 2014. The current millage expires June 30, 2025.

I live in the Fraser Public Schools district. If the non-homestead millage renewal and replacement passes, will my property taxes increase?

No. The tax applies to non-homestead properties like commercial, industrial or rental property, not your primary residence.

I thought schools no longer received funding through property taxes. Why is Fraser Public Schools asking for a millage renewal?

Funding for Michigan school districts changed significantly when voters passed Proposal A in 1994. Under Proposal A, the state funds a portion of public school districts, but to receive full funding, schools must levy 18 mills on non-homestead property in the district.

Why is Fraser Public Schools asking for 21 mills when the state only requires 18 mills?

Legally, Fraser Public Schools is only allowed to levy a maximum of 18 mills. Due to the Headlee amendment. the 18 mills assessment is rolled back each year, and the district can currently only assess 17.4682 mills on non-homestead property.

The district is seeking a replacement of the currently authorized 17.4682 mills which would otherwise expire on June 30, 2025, and a restoration of 0.5318 mills lost as a result of the reduction due to Headlee rollbacks. The remaining 3 mills would serve as a means to protect against future Headlee rollbacks. By approving more than 18 mills, voters can help quarantee a more stable budget for the district by ensuring the district is able to collect taxes on non-homestead property at the full 18 mills.

What if the millage does not pass?

If the non-homestead millage is not renewed. Fraser Public Schools will continue to not be able to assess the full 18 mils that voters approved in 2014. Due to the Headlee rollback, the district currently assesses 17.4682 mils. This amounts to \$621,923 in lost revenue since 2014.

The State of Michigan will not replace the lost revenue; therefore, Fraser Public Schools would have to reduce programs and staff to reach a balanced budget.
