MAKE YOUR **ENROLLMENT SELECTION**

The Board of Education was presented with three options for returning to school at the October 12 meeting. After review, the Board voted to return to face-to-face learning five days a week beginning November 30. There will still be a robust virtual option available for all families as well.

- DK will only have a face-to-face option.
- Elementary K-6 families will have one choice to make that will be effective from November 30 June 16.
- Secondary 7-12 families will have two choices to make:
 - November 30 January 22 (Virtual or Face-to-Face)
 - January 25 Second Semester (Virtual or Face-to-Face)

We have prioritized transitioning our elementary students first. This was a state-wide priority. It also closely coordinates with the First Trimester at these buildings. Secondary students will fully transition at the start of Second Semester.

CURRICULUMCORNER

WHAT IS A LEARNING MANAGEMENT SYSTEM (LMS)?

As we all learn to navigate the virtual learning environment, it is important to understand the different tools we use to help our students. The most important tool for our parents and students to understand is the Learning Management System, or LMS. In our district, we use two programs: itslearning for elementary students and BlackBoard for middle and high school students.

WHAT IS AN LMS?

The LMS is the digital classroom for our teachers. It is the organizational space for all course content, and should be a student's first stop every day or every class period. Content is organized by date. In itslearning, a daily post in the homeroom course separates the content by subject matter. In BlackBoard, the daily content is sorted by class period or block.

The district has created templates for teachers to use, so content should be similar and organized in the same way across all classes.

WHY IS THE LMS IMPORTANT?

Teachers upload lessons, assignments and videos into the LMS each day for students to access. Teachers may also send students to learning apps or websites from links inside the LMS.

This year, students will also find the links and scheduled times to connect to their GoToMeetings inside the LMS.

HOW TO USE THE LMS

When students log in to the LMS, they will first see that day's content.

In itslearning, content is organized by subject in the homeroom course. Clicking on the yellow subject buttons will take you to the full week of lessons for that subject, as well as supplemental resources related to the content area. Lessons from previous days and weeks can also be accessed by using the course tree, found under resources at the top of the screen.

In BlackBoard, content is organized by course. Clicking on the courses listed on the right will take you to posted lessons for each subject. Once you enter a course, in the center section of the page you will see necessary course information such as posted lessons, GoToMeeting links and other resources. To access lessons, look for the "Pathways to Learning" folder. Current lessons and lessons from previous days can be found within the "Pathways to Learning" folder.

We are continuously improving the student experience in our LMS and sharing best practices among our staff. With help from parents and learning coaches, we can all work together to make virtual learning a success.

We also have Parent guides to both LMS platforms on our **website**. Look under the Student/Parent Information.

VIEW THE TEACHER IN GOTOMEETING

More than 3,000 students in our district use an iPad to connect to their virtual class meetings, and they may not always see their teacher's camera. The default view on GoToMeeting on a tablet is to see the cameras of six people. Avoid unnecessary frustration by following these easy steps to ensure your child can view the teacher:

- When in to a GoToMeeting, click on View.
- Select "View Who's Talking."
- Done! Your child will now see only the speaker's camera.

As we all adjust to a new way of learning, we know technology is important to making sure our learning environment works. You can also visit our website for more information about our virtual learning and technology.


EASILY ACCESS THE **HEALTH SCREENER**

Free Meals Available to All Students

In an effort to help us prepare and meet the needs of our community, we are hoping you will take a few minutes to review the information contained below to assist you with our new procedures.

PICKUP INFORMATION

Monday – Friday Fraser High School Cafeteria Enter on Klein Road side 7:00 – 11:00 a.m.

Fridays will now include weekend meals. Parents will receive three breakfasts and three lunches during the Friday meal pickup.


- Breakfast and lunch available to all children up to age 18.
- The student does not have to be present for meal pick-up.
- We are requesting that meals be pre-ordered by parents to assist our Food Service Department with determining meal participation.
- Parents can pre-order meals up to a week in advance using the sendmoneytoschool.com website.
- Students in SACC/Early Childhood Care will be provided both a breakfast and a lunch on days they are attending the program. These will be delivered to their classroom.

FREE AND REDUCED MEAL APPLICATION

Funding for the current free meals program is only approved through December and could be eliminated at any time.

Parents are strongly encouraged to complete a Free and Reduced Meal Application at lunchapp.com. Once this free program ends, your meal price will be dependent on your child's eligibility status. In addition, your application status could make your child eligible for other support from the district.
