Fraser Public Schools is excited to offer "Meet Up and Eat Up," a free summer meal program for children at Fraser High School and McKinley Barrier-Free Park.

Meals will begin on Monday, June 20 and continue Monday — Friday throughout the summer. Fraser High School will offer breakfast from 7:30 — 9:00 a.m. and lunch from 11:00 a.m. — 1:00 p.m. McKinley Barrier-Free Park will offer only lunch rom 12:00 — 1:00 p.m.

Meals will be balanced and healthy. Lunch on the first day will be cheese pizza, fruit, vegetable and milk.

Most recently, the 4th-grade students came to FHS to work on ceiling tiles that are now on display at Emerson. A week later, 5th-grade students teamed up to paint panels that will be displayed during Clinton Township's Festival of the Senses.



The ceiling tile project started 13 years ago. Elementary art teacher Mrs. Babcock now includes painting tiles into her curriculum.

The high school students are handpicked to participate. They develop the concept for their piece that is appropriate for the 4th- and 5th-grade groups. They also research strategies to teach and manage their time during the painting day. The high school students use their artistic knowledge to teach the elementary students new techniques.

This is the first time Festival of the Senses has accepted panels from younger artists, said Mrs. Susi DiPace, FHS art teacher. She contacted the organizers, who initially declined receiving art from younger artists. But a few weeks later, they called back after seeing the quality of work from Fraser students, and asked for the students to participate.



Each year, both levels of students highly anticipate participating in this project. They are excited from start to finish, but the elementary students are extremely proud once the tiles are placed back into the ceiling.

"As a sophomore, I saw elementary students on the ceiling tile field trip, I knew it was something I wanted it do," said Susara Greene, FHS student.

High school student, Olivia Fleet added, "It made me really happy when one of the students in my group said they didn't want to leave and that this day was the best!"

Disney Students Learning at Their Own Pace

Every trimester, Fraser elementary students participate in lessons from a reading genre unit. In the second and third trimester of 6th grade, Disney students read and were engaged in various activities for the book, "Jason's Gold" and "Ella Enchanted." This year, as part of our District challenge and ItsLearning management system, Mrs. Sara Loveridge decided to instruct Disney's 60 6th graders in a different way. This year, students were able and encouraged to work



at their own pace for the novels. While there was a basic pace suggested for students, those students who were able to move forward were encouraged to do so.

Within ItsLearning, lessons, chapters, reading responses and activities were set in a "movewhen-ready model." As students completed activities to a satisfactory expectation by the teacher, the next level of assignments would open so they could move forward. With this learning model, lessons were organized ahead of time and entered into the system with release details. Similar to achieving various levels within a game, students earn the ability to move on to the next chapters and assignments by unlocking the next level.

While there was a weekly classroom pace and expectation Mrs. Loveridge would recommend for the class as a whole, students were encouraged to gather in reading groups to collaborate and work together. Mason states, "It was beneficial because they have a due date, but you have the freedom to do your work within your own space and pace."

Taylor added, "When you complete an assignment at a satisfactory level, the next assignment would open for you. There was no asking for permission to move on or waiting for the entire class to finish."

Within the assignments and activities, they also tried to vary the activities from standard focus question responses, comprehension and connections. They have been able to add vocabulary work through Spelling City, reading fluency with Reader's Theatre, visualization of the text through art and drawing, and team or student discussions with their peers and the teacher. In this way, they are able to reach all learning modalities of the students at some point within their genre unit.

Ramblers Win Student Emmy

The Fraser High School Journalism students continue to win awards for their news story "Metal Mettle." The story most recently won the Pillar of Excellence, or Student Emmy, from the Michigan High School Student Television Awards for Excellence.

"These awards are intended to be an incentive for the pursuit of excellence in television production and to focus public attention on outstanding achievements in television produced by high school students," said Jamie Flanagan, Journalism teacher at FHS.

Fraser High School received its award for the entry in the News: General Assignment category. "Metal Mettle" was created by Isabella Crook, Keenan Penn II, and Austin White. It features Shannon Stover in her welding class. The story was created as part of our ongoing relationship with the *PBS NewHour* Student Reporting Labs.

Autism Teacher Consultant Bridget Murawski wanted to do something that brought awareness to all that the District does to support students with Autism Spectrum Disorders. After talking with a few staff and administrators, it was decided she would organize a giant ribbon of support on the field during 6th-grade field day. More than 450 students from all six elementary schools helped create the ribbon.

Fraser Public Schools has the largest Peer to Peer (P2P) program in Macomb County. Our District P2P programs span from Kindergarten to 12th grade and serve 469 Fraser students: 419 peers and 50 students with Autism Spectrum Disorders. Currently the District serves more than 80 students with ASD DK-12th grade.

"Peer to peer support programs increase opportunities for students with ASD to access general education settings and curriculum," Ms. Murawski said. "Peers model typical academic and social behavior in educational environments throughout the school day and provide support for students with ASD to promote independence and socialization."

The P2P programs benefits not only the students with ASD, but also the peers who gain leadership skills.



Boys' Baseball

The 2016 Fraser varsity baseball team finished with a 19-13 record. This year's team had 14 new members after losing 11 seniors to graduation in 2015. The team was able to repeat as MAC Gold Champs with a 10-5 league record. The back-to-back championships are a first for Fraser baseball since entering the Macomb Athletic Conference. The team again advanced to the regional finals with a 4-0 win over Cousino



before losing to De La Salle in the finals. The team improved a great deal through the season. They had a nine-game winning streak that led to the league co-championship and played very well in district play.



Boys' Golf

Boys' golf had another great season this year, qualifying as a team, or qualifying an individual player for regionals for the tenth year in a row. Although the eight-year team streak ended last year, we are still having individuals qualify each year — which speaks volumes to the depth of our program. The varsity team had a disappointing year as far as overall record goes (2-8), however we will have five of our six players back, with a very promising group of players from our highly dominant JV team. The team's future

is looking brighter than ever. Our captain and MVP Adam Culver will return for his senior season, with four of our six varsity players only sophomores and juniors. Speaking of bright, our players received many academic honors. Our entire varsity golf team was MAC All-Academic this season. Overall the season was a great success. Girls' Tennis

The girls' tennis team repeated as MAC Blue champs this season, going 3-0-2 in the league and 8-0-2 in the last two years. The girls finished this season with a 5-3-2 mark. More impressive than the girls' winning ways is the outstanding academic performance with a team GPA of 3.55. This year, four girls earned All-County Honors as junior Amanda Melo earned 1st team recognition, while Barbara Clark, Emily Solecki and Noel Bielski earned Dream Team honors as some of the best players in all of Macomb County.





Girls' Softball

The softball team finished the spring season with a 21-10 overall record, and 4th in the MAC Blue with a 6-6 record. Alexis and Casey Spencer also made the All League team, with Kirstyn Maluchnik and Kasey Karol making the honorable mention all league. The team will lose four seniors to graduation: Alexis Belfiori, Casey Spencer, Chayse Anderer and McKayla Davey. Casey will continue her softball career at the collegiate level, playing for Macomb Community College in the fall.



Girls' Soccer

The entire team was named All Academic All State for having an average player GPA of 3.34. In addition, four seniors made the Academic All-State team for having a 3.5 or higher GPA. They were Abby Moss, Gabby Anderson, Danielle Foster and Allison Kowalski. The team went 12-7-5 overall this season. The team was plagued with injuries, but still went to the Petoskey Invitational and won for the third time in the last four years. Four-year starter Tyler Ledford tied the all-time FHS record for starting in 89 games, and Abbi Fillar started in 87. Tyler will go on to play soccer at Waldorf University in Iowa this fall.
