DISTRICT TESTS FOR LEAD: All Buildings Well Below Limits

In light of the water crisis in Flint and surrounding areas, Fraser Public Schools contracted an independent lab to test the water levels in all buildings.

"It's the District's responsibility to provide a safe environment for our students, staff and community," said Gerry Gauthier, president of the Board of Education. "Water testing is one of the many procedures taken to assure that safe environment."

Paragon Laboratories, based in Livonia, conducted the tests in all District buildings. The water was tested after sitting all night.

"Fraser Public Schools took the initiative to have all of our buildings tested as a precautionary measure," said Superintendent Dr. Dave Richards.

"Our goal was to be proactive rather than reactive, and we are pleased that the results have shown our water sources are significantly below the acceptable levels."

The results came back well-below the standard set by the Environmental Protection Agency. A majority of the samples had no detectable levels of lead.

"Student and staff safety and welfare is our top priority," said Director of Operations and Maintenance Dan Waters. "With everything in the news about cities and other districts detecting lead in their water, FPS wanted to ensure our buildings were safe."

The Detroit Water and Sewerage Department, who provides water to FPS, also tests the water monthly.

Training Builds Partnership Between Police, Schools

About 15 members of the Fraser Department of Public Safety recently gathered in a classroom at Richards Middle School one evening when the building was empty. They were there to practice their skills in the event of an active shooter or violent situation.

"We hope we never have to use it, but you have to train for the unknown," said Detective David Bisby. "The training that we do is applicable to any sort of violent situation, not just something in the school."

After a brief meeting, officers split into small groups to seek out another officer, acting as an active shooter hiding somewhere in the building.

"The opportunity to allow our Fraser Public Safety to conduct their active shooter training in our schools is critically important if there ever was a situation where we needed our law enforcement officers to secure our buildings," said Superintendent Dr. Dave Richards. "By allowing them to train in our hallways, they not only become familiar with our buildings, but

raser has proven learning does not stop when the bell rings on the last day of school," said 21st Century teacher Jarod McGuffey. "Kids will learn at their best this summer when they are relaxed, having authentic conversations with adults, inspired to inquire, and reminded that their brain needs to be challenged with 'Thinking Exercise.'"

Questionaut – Questionaut is a Math, English and Science game from the BBC. The premise of the game is a standard question/answer delivery, but students will have to work and explore to be given the questions.

Moby Max – Parents can sign up for a free account to monitor their children online. It offers personalized lessons for students in math, ELA, reading and test preparation.

KUTA Software – Students and parents can access this site for more standard pre-algebra and algebra worksheets with practice and answer keys.

Newsela.com – Newsela provides current events and daily news in an easy-to-understand way for students. Quizzes at the end of articles gauge students' reading comprehension.

they are able to develop an understanding of the stairwells, hallways and classroom layouts."


The department trains in shifts, and each shift tries to practice what they've learned twice a year. "Familiarity with the building is key," Bisby said. He added that two-thirds of the department work when schools are closed, so having an opportunity to train inside a school is important.

"We are truly blessed in Fraser to have a highly qualified department of police officers to protect our

schools and our students. By working together, our schools and public safety department are taking the necessary steps to provide a safe learning environment for our students and staff," Richards said.




RMS Named Top Emerald School in County

Richards Middle School was presented with the Top Emerald School Award at the Michigan Green Schools Award Program on April 15 at the MISD. A school is eligible to receive a Green School, Emerald School or Evergreen School Environmental Stewardship Designation if the school or students perform at least two green activities from the four categories of Reduce/Reuse/Recycle, Energy, Environmental Protection and Miscellaneous. To earn the Emerald School designation, RMS completed 15 total activities.

RMS procured the highest number of points out of all the Emerald Schools in Macomb County. They earned that honor by transforming the RMS courtyard into a more organic green zone, focusing on creating a butterfly/bee sanctuary, and collaborating with FPS food service to compost leftovers from the RMS kitchen. Also, they continue to recycle paper and plastic, reusing old magazines in the RMS maker-space, and holding a fundraiser for their adopted Detroit Zoo animals. Finally, they spent an afternoon clearing debris and trash from the watershed on Garfield Road.

Salk Students Win First Place in Macomb County Bar Association Essay Contest



Four 6th-grade students from Salk Elementary won first place in the county-wide Law Day Poster and Essay contest sponsored by the Macomb County Bar Foundation. The contest was open to all Macomb County students in grades 1 through 8. The theme was "Miranda: More than Words."

"I wanted to show my students how they can take a mandatory writing topic and twist it into being something that they want to write about through creativity and knowledge of the subject," said teacher Kelly Jenks.

All essays had to be 300 words or less. But after brainstorming ideas and learning about Miranda rights, four students in Kelly Jenks' 6th-grade class felt they needed more words to explain it. The students, Olivia Gilcher, Ella Scally, Grace Oluwole and Calvin Hill, decided to take a chance and write the essay in four parts, knowing it might result in automatic disqualification.

"At first I thought, 'Oh no, we won't have a chance,' because our essay will be over 300 words," said Calvin Hill. "Then I thought it'll definitely get the judges' attention and stump them because it will be different."

The judges said during the awards presentation in front of parents, teachers and principals that they had never received an essay written in parts. The students received a certificate and \$25 gift card. But they also learned more about their rights and the writing process.

"I thought it was just an essay contest, but I learned Miranda is very important to our history and to our rights," said Ella Scally.

Fraser Public Schools Recognizes Longtime Supporter

"Life has just been good to me," said Delia Martin, Fraser Education Foundation (FEF) trustee, longtime District supporter and founder of El Charro Mexican Restaurant. Superintendent Dr. David Richards presented a plaque to Mrs. Martin and her family for their continued support at the April 18 Board of Education meeting. Mrs. Martin's four children, George Junior, Mark, Jeffrey and Lynn, graduated from Fraser High School. She said the dedication of the staff she saw as a parent was reinforced when she joined the FEF.

Andrea Filip, a third-grade teacher at Disney Elementary, received a \$3,000 mini grant from the Martin family this year. She purchased flexible seating, books, prize wheels and historical costumes for her students to use in Social Studies Olympiad. "I thought I would aim for the stars and apply for the grant," Filip said. "I was so surprised when I found out it was selected."






DK Erupts with Science

The Developmental Kindergarten class at the Dooley Center has been learning about animal life cycles and animals that come from eggs vs. mammals that are born alive. Recently, they learned that reptiles and dinosaurs are born from eggs. Their discussion about dinosaurs led to some theories as to why they are now extinct; including a massive volcanic eruption.

Students were very interested in learning more about volcanoes and made some of their own from plastic containers and paper mâché. They learned that magma is melted rock that builds up inside a volcano and when there's too much pressure, it erupts. To demonstrate, they put "magma" in their volcano (red food dye) and erupted it with a mixture of baking soda, and vinegar!




STUDENTS CREATE INVASIVE SPECIES CALENDAR

Cranbrook Science Night at Salk

The 2nd-grade students at Salk Elementary and their families enjoyed the Fourth Annual Cranbrook Family Science Night. As part of their "Science on the Go" program, Cranbrook Science Institute educators visited Salk and set up 14 fun, hands-on activities. Stations included astronomy, learning about the constellations; chemistry, discovering properties; earth science, uncovering and identifying dinosaur bones; life science, examining a model of the heart, using a stethoscope,

and identifying insects; physical science, using magnets, learning changes of states from solid to liquid, and examining "oobleck;" and mathematics, using 3D models for spatial knowledge, and experiencing static electricity with the Van de Graff Generator.

At each station, a trained volunteer offered one-onone instruction for parents and students. Parents were thrilled that they were invited to attend this event. Some parents were seen holding the Madagascar cockroach and others were caught digging for dinosaur bones!

"This is the fourth year of having our Family Science Night in-house field trip," said Mrs. Chambers, 2nd-grade teacher. "However, it is our students' first time attending, since it is for 2nd-graders only. This in-house event is a student favorite and is talked about for years to come!"



Eagle Scout Project at Edison



Fraser High School freshman Hunter Soper is working to achieve Boy Scouts of America's highest rank of Eagle Scout. That level requires a service project that Hunter had to plan, organize, lead and manage. When it came time to determine what that project would be, he knew where to start: Edison Elementary.

"It's my old elementary school, so I wanted to find something here," Soper said.

He met with Edison Principal Dr. Kristi Weiss to brainstorm ideas. They determined the basketball court on the playground would be the best fit.

"He had several proposals, and the painting of the basketball court seemed the best idea since our students LOVE to play basketball," Weiss said.

Hunter then had to fundraise for supplies, paint, nets and everything he needed to complete the project. He hosted bottle drives in several neighborhoods, picking them up and returning them every week for several months. He raised about \$1,100 through his efforts. Once he got started, it took two full days to paint every inch of the court.

"When I saw the completed project, I was amazed," Weiss said. "I thought Hunter was just going to re-stripe the faded lines. Little did I know he painted every single thing — the entire court, the key, the backboards, and added new nets."

He says seeing the finished product was worth the effort.

"It's nice to see the kids using it," he said.

Hunter now has to complete and submit all the paperwork to determine if he will achieve the rank of Eagle Scout.

It has been a very successful inaugural year for the Saving Animals Club. The students showed a lot of responsibility and compassion, and they did a wonderful job helping animals in need.

Disney Students Explain the Brain

Students Design Bookmarks




"They learn important life skills in working with businesses, following up, responsibility, perseverance and determination," said Family and Consumer Sciences Teacher Stacie Yokhana.
